Academic emphasis – General education, technical/occupational, terminal and transfer programs

Degree programs

Administrative office support (legal assistant and medical office assistance options), agriculture, art, business administration (pre-accounting option), computer science (computer support specialist and computer electronics options), criminal justice, drafting and design-CAD, early childhood education, education (pre-elementary), English, equine and ranch management, general studies, marketing and management (accounting option), medical laboratory technician, natural resources ecology and management, natural sciences (biology, physical science, pre-allied health, and pre-medicine options), nursing (associate degree), physical therapist assistant, mass communications (electronic media), music, Native American studies, nursing (pre-BSN), physical education and recreation (pre-athletic training option), pre-engineering (math), pre-veterinary medicine, psychology and sociology (social work option), social science, speech and theatre.

Class times offered – Daytime and evening. Courses are also offered by Interactive television and online.

Special programs – NEO offers dozens of continuing education courses each semester that feature a variety of topics. The Nursing Program is entering its fifth year for the Fast-Track-to-RN Program, which allows those who meet pre-requisites to receive their RN in one calendar year as opposed to the 18-months of course work typically required. NEO has entered into formal articulation agreements with Rogers State University, Oklahoma Wesleyan University, Cameron State University and Missouri State University in Springfield, Mo. These agreements allow courses taken at NEO to transfer seamlessly to other institutions. The college has also partnered with the University of Oklahoma to offer a bachelor's degree in nursing that can be obtained on the NEO campus.

High school curriculum requirements

ACT/SAT requirements – Students must complete the ACT. There are no ACT scoring requirements.

Application process – If the student is under the age of 21, he or she must complete the ACT. All students must submit an official final high school transcript or GED equivalent to the NEO Admissions Office..

Application deadlines – There is no formal deadline for an admissions application. However, students must apply and be accepted by the start of classes.

Transfer Students

Minimum college GPA required – 2.0

Maximum credits transferable – 45

Items required for application – Application for admissions and college transcripts. If the student has less than 24 earned hours from their transfer institution, the student would also be required to submit a high school transcript and ACT scores (if under age of 21).

TOEFL test requirements – TOEFL report with a score of 500 (computer 173) or an official TOEFLiBT report with a score of 61. Also acceptable is an official international TOEFL of 460-499 (computer 140-172) or TOEFLiBT of 48 and a certificate of completion from a 12 week intensive English-study program. Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College is a two-year college in Miami with a campus in Grove that is known for its small class sizes, one-on-one instruction, campus life and athletics. NEO has a high number of full-time faculty who are committed to providing the best educational experience possible for the students. NEO is the only two-year institution in the state that has a football program. In 2008, the college completed the renovation of its gymnasium, Health Sciences Building and Commons Hall, which houses the music department. NEO offers associate degrees and one- and two-year certificate programs in 44 majors. The college also partners with several four-year state institutions to offer bachelor's degrees in selected majors. Traditional classroom courses provide delivery selection, convenience and flexible scheduling. Online courses, evening classes and distance learning opportunities are available.

Food services

Special student services

NEO offers special services to its students with disabilities, including extended time for homework and tests, test readers, writers and notetakers. The college also utilizes assistive technology that includes a closed circuit television and a program for visually impaired students to navigate the computer. Student Support Services, a grant-funded program, provides qualifying NEO students with tutoring, supplemental instruction classes, career exploration, financial and personal counseling and workshops on study skills, job interview techniques and communication. The NEO Allied Jobs Program assists customers of DHS with employment services by increasing their workplace skill level with academics, short-term occupational training and on-the-job training. NEO Upward Bound is a federally funded program that serves first-generation or low-income high school students. Upward Bound prepares students to be successful in post-secondary education by introducing them to social, political, academic, cultural, and occupational information pertinent to success in college. The organization helps ensure that students are academically and socially successful in high school, which is the first step toward college entrance and completion.
