SUBJECT: University of Oklahoma. Approval to offer the Master of Science in Environmental Studies in Environmental Studies and the Graduate Certificate in Finance.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve the University of Oklahoma's requests to offer the Master of Science in Environmental Studies in Environmental Studies and the Graduate Certificate in Finance, with the stipulation that continuation of the programs will depend upon meeting the criteria established by the institution and approved by the State Regents, as described below.

• Master of Science in Environmental Studies in Environmental Studies. Continuation beyond Fall 2022 will depend upon meeting the following criteria:

Majors enrolled: a minimum of 6 students in Fall 2021; and

Graduates: a minimum of 3 students in 2021-2022.

• **Graduate Certificate in Finance.** The graduate certificate is embedded within the Master of Business Administration in Business Administration (025) and will be included in the regular 5-year program review.

BACKGROUND:

Academic Plan

The University of Oklahoma's (OU) 2017-2018 Academic Plan lists the following institutional priorities and new funding initiatives:

- We will continue our aggressive recruitment of large freshmen classes and improve the
 processing of graduate student applicants for admission. We are in our second year of using
 the Common Application for undergraduates and in the second year of using the College-Net
 software for processing applications for graduate students.
- We will continue an intense focus on undergraduate retention and graduate rates by 1) utilizing data from holistic admissions to provide early invention/mentoring/tutoring for students whose profiles suggest they will profit from aggressive intervention, 2)increase the coordination of undergraduate academic advising across campus, and 3) enhance course offerings during summer session. Additionally, we will continue to work to get undergraduate students taking 30 or more hours per year via the flat rate tuition policy to get them on a 4/5 year timeline to degree completion.
- Several retention analyses are being undertaken at the university, including broad cohort analyses by University College and the Provost's Office. In addition, Dr. Glenn Hansen, IT

- data scientist, is assisting individual schools and colleges with retention analyses of their majors.
- We will continue to manage undergraduate course offerings to adequately meet student needs for courses by requiring course sections to be close to fully enrolled and by adding sections (or increasing course size) as needed to meet student demand by utilizing qualified instructors, lecturers, and other adjunct instructors. We have identified a director position in University College (George Bogaski). This process has been steadily improved and has increased in impact more deans, chairs, and directors are responding to identify needs in order to avert enrollment crises.
- We continue to collect mid-semester grades at the end of the eighth week of the Fall and Spring semesters in order to help students and advisors understand how the students are performing academically. Grades are required of instructors to submit for students in all 1000 level courses, but grading is available in the system for all courses. The following week, University College and other academic advisement/coaching units are provided with a list of students and their mid-semester grades. Appropriate contact and interventions follow. Mid-semester grades are available to all students in OZONE.

APRA Implementation

In August 1991, the State Regents launched the Academic Planning/Resource Allocation (APRA) initiative, which was based on the principle that institutional officials would prioritize their programs and activities, and then fund higher priority activities at levels that ensured quality. In times of flat or declining budgets or financial constraints, institutions are expected to reallocate resources from lower priority activities to higher priority activities, rather than reducing quality by funding lower priority activities at the same rate as higher priority activities.

Since 1992, the University of Oklahoma (OU) has taken the following program actions in response to APRA:

Program Review

OU offers 302 degree and/or certificate programs as follows:

All of these programs were reviewed in the past five years with the exception of those programs with specialty accreditation. Programs with specialty accreditation are aligned with OU's program review schedule as appropriate. Thus, if a professional program received a ten-year accreditation, it would not be reviewed for ten years, which is an approved exception to State Regents' policy.

Program Development Process

OU's faculty developed the proposals, which were reviewed and approved by institutional officials. OU's governing board approved delivery of the Master of Science in Environmental Studies in Environmental

Studies at their June 20, 2017 meeting and the Graduate Certificate in Finance at their May 4, 2017 meeting. OU requests authorization to offer these programs as outlined below.

POLICY ISSUES:

These actions are consistent with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Academic Program Approval policy.

ANALYSIS:

Master of Science in Environmental Studies in Environmental Studies

Program purpose. The proposed program will train students in applied environmental fields, including conservation biology, water studies, and society and the environment. Students will gain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment or continued education in a doctoral program.

Program rationale and background. Environmental Studies within the College of Arts and Sciences is designed to provide a student-guided curriculum that will create the leadership and workforce needed to address global challenges relating to water security and other critical environmental issues. Currently, OU offers a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Studies (423) and a Bachelor of Arts in Environmental Studies (422). Numerous alumni and current students in Environmental Studies have expressed interest in a multidisciplinary graduate program that would prepare them for either advancement in the broad environmental workforce or further graduate studies in environmentally related fields ranging from public service and politics to environmental consulting, journalism, and corporate public relations. The proposed program is designed to be interdisciplinary to allow students the flexibility to tailor their course selection toward their career goals. The primary objectives of the program are to provide a graduate curriculum that leverages environmentally related strengths and expertise across campus for scholarly specialization in environmental disciplines and to ensure students are prepared to participate effectively in socially responsible solutions to some of the most critical environmental problems facing society.

Employment opportunities. Employer demand for master's level Environmental Studies graduates is high nationally, regionally, and locally. Businesses of all sizes recognize the critical importance of being able to respond appropriately and effectively to the environmental challenges they face. Additionally, municipal, state, regional, tribal, and federal agencies, as well as political, social, national, and global advocacy institutions and special interest groups are looking to graduates of environmental studies programs to fill positions that bridge the socio-political, economic, and technical complexities inherent to all environmental concerns. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, employment opportunities in the environmental field, including compliance and economic positions, environmental specialists in engineering and science, epidemiologists and educational specialist in forestry, conservation, and law, and specialists in public relations and occupational and environmental health, are expected to grow as much as 26 percent through 2022. Within the State of Oklahoma, the employment outlook is similarly optimistic, with career opportunities in these fields increasing approximately 12 percent through 2024. OU is confident that students will find employment upon completion of their program.

Student demand. The proposed program is expected to meet the enrollment and graduation standards by the established deadline prior to final approval by the State Regents as shown in the following table.

A system wide letter of intent was communicated by email on May 17, 2017. Oklahoma State University (OSU) and East Central University (ECU) requested a copy of the proposal, which was sent July 7, 2017 and July 12, 2017, respectively. Neither OSU, ECU, nor any other State System institution notified State Regents' staff of a protest to the proposed programs. Due to distance between institutions, approval will not constitute unnecessary duplication.

Curriculum. The proposed Master of Science in Environmental Studies in Environmental Studies program will consist of 30 total credit hours as shown in the following table. No new courses will be added and the curriculum is detailed in the attachment (Attachment A).

Faculty and staff. Existing faculty will teach the proposed program.

Support services. The library, classroom, and lab space are adequate for the degree program.

Financing. The proposed program will be offered on a self-supporting basis and the current tuition and fee structure will be sufficient to adequately fund the program. No additional funding is requested from the State Regents to support the program.

Graduate Certificate in Finance

Program purpose. The proposed program provides students with specialized course work in finance and will formally document the completion of the finance specialization for students pursing the Master of Business Administration in Business Administration (MBA) (025) program.

Program rationale and employment opportunities. Career opportunities for Finance Managers and Financial Analysts continue to remain strong and are expected to increase 10 to 13 percent through 2024. To address the need for qualified employees, the Michael F. Price College of Business launched a finance specialization in Fall 2008 for MBA students. This specialization allows students to deepen their knowledge and background in the finance sector and is one of the most sought after focus areas of the MBA program. Currently, of the 207 students enrolled in the MBA program, 80 candidates are seeking the finance specialization. However, as a specialization, no designation of the finance specialization is provided on the student's transcript. In Fall 2016, the faculty approved the creation of the Graduate Certificate in Finance to formally document student's knowledge and skills in the discipline. Officially documenting the completion of specialized course work in finance on a transcript will allow students to better market themselves when seeking employment or career advancement.

Student demand. The proposed graduate certificate program is expected to fulfill student demand within the Master of Business Administration in Business Administration (025) program.

Duplication and impact on existing programs. There are no Graduate Certificate in Finance programs offered in Oklahoma. A system wide letter of intent was communicated via email on May 17, 2017. Oklahoma State University (OSU) requested a copy of the proposal, which was sent on July 31, 2017. Neither OSU nor any other State System institution notified State Regents' staff of a protest to the proposed certificate program. Approval will not constitute unnecessary duplication.

Curriculum. The proposed graduate certificate program will consist of 12-13 total credit hours as shown in the following table. No new courses will be added and the curriculum is detailed in the attachment (Attachment B).

Faculty and staff. Existing faculty will teach the proposed program.

Financing and program resource requirements. The proposed graduate certificate program is an embedded certificate within the Master of Business Administration in Business Administration (025) program. Program resource requirements are supported through the main program and the certificate will be offered on a self-supporting basis. Current tuition and fee structure will be sufficient to adequately fund the certificate. No additional funding is requested from the State Regents to support the certificate.

SUBJECT: Oklahoma State University. Approval to offer the Bachelor of Science in American

Studies.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve Oklahoma State University's request to offer the Bachelor of Science in American Studies, with an option in Pre-Law, with the stipulation that continuation of the program will depend upon meeting the criteria established by the institution and approved by the State Regents, as described below.

• **Bachelor of Science in American Studies.** Continuation beyond Fall 2022 will depend upon meeting the following criteria:

Majors enrolled: a minimum of 13 students in Fall 2021; and

Graduates: a minimum of 5 students in 2021-2022.

BACKGROUND:

Academic Plan

Oklahoma State University's (OSU) 2017-2018 Academic Plan lists the following institutional priorities and new funding initiatives:

CAS, College of Arts and Sciences

- Retention remains the top priority. Several new initiatives to improve retention include working with department heads to place high caliber instructors in courses taken by first-year students and converting lecturer and adjunct instructional appointments to Teaching Assistant Professor positions to attract high quality faculty working on multi-year contracts.
- Curriculum revision is a second priority. CAS departments and schools are presently involved in efforts to update and modernize undergraduate and graduate degree and certificate programs in ways that recognize changing workforce needs and career opportunities. This initiative has included a reexamination of general education courses, departmental course requirements for degrees, and the content and organization associated with individual courses.

CASNR, College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources

• Improving undergraduate retention and graduation rates is a main priority. Departments are reexamining academic advising support, promoting undergraduate research opportunities, offering extensive internship programs, and completing comprehensive reviews of degree programs. The college is also providing support for retention and academic success programs, including the adoption of a personal financial literacy curriculum.

- Increasing graduate program enrollment and corresponding assistantship support is another priority. While the investment in GTA stipends has increased, support for GRA positions has decreased due to reductions in the OAES budget and retirements/departures of research faculty. Quality graduate students are critical to faculty research success and also to support undergraduate student retention.
- The Department of Animal Science is considering a name change to better reflect both undergraduate majors offered in the department (animal science and food science).

CEAT, College of Engineering, Architecture and Technology

- Matching resources and academic opportunities with growing enrollment is the main priority. CEAT is in process of installing new qualified admissions criteria for freshman and transfer students. These new criteria will apply to fall 2018 incoming students.
- Improving freshman retention is parallel to this effort. CEAT has developed a new Freshman Living Learning Community with focused programming in Parker Hall available fall 2017.
- Increase the technology fee this year and consider increases in the future to attain at least on par with peers for technology resources.
- Continue to grow the CEAT faculty and update CEAT facilities to meet growing enrollment and to modernize classrooms and labs.

COE, College of Education

- Increasing enrollment growth in new degree programs in Nursing, Exercise Science, and the Master of Arts in Teaching is a main priority.
- Increasing the rate of degree completion in our undergraduate majors is also a priority.

COHS, College of Human Sciences

- An increase in undergraduate enrollment in two academic majors within the Human Sciences College (Design, Housing & Merchandising; Hotel & Restaurant Administration) while maintaining undergraduate enrollment in two other academic majors (Nutritional Sciences; Human Development and Family Science) is a primary priority.
- The School of Hotel & Restaurant Administration (HRAD) will have a name change to Hospitality & Tourism Management. They will also propose change to the name of the undergraduate major to Hospitality & Tourism Management including four embedded specializations, allowing each student to choose an emphasis associated with his/her chosen career path. The School is making adjustments to undergraduate program requirements in keeping with changes in the hospitality industry and in sync with the program's Advisory Board input.

SSB, Spears School of Business

- The introduction and roll-out of new and revised courses in the core curriculum, which include interpersonal, leadership, and career-readiness skills, along with expansion of Excel and data analysis skills are the main priorities.
- Ensuring that all students have access to and participate in a variety of career-readiness initiatives, including Eastin Center activities, mentoring, internships, and study abroad is an additional priority.

CVHS, Center for Veterinary Health Sciences

- Rebuilding faculty in key specialties is a main priority.
- Completing a comprehensive curriculum review is an additional priority.

OSU-Tulsa

• Development of an Academic Strategic Plan is a main priority.

OSU-CHS, Center for Health Sciences

- Opening of the TANDY Medical Academic Building with its medical simulation center is a
 major milestone which will facilitate the training of medical students and residents with state-ofthe art simulation facilities. Through strategic planning, the priorities are being assessed and best
 use of vacated space at the CHS by the opening of the TANDY Medical Academic Building is
 under consideration.
- Internal review of all graduate programs as part of a strategic assessment to determine the direction of each of the respective programs for the next 10 years is an additional priority.

APRA Implementation

In August 1991, the State Regents launched the Academic Planning/Resource Allocation (APRA) initiative, which was based on the principle that institutional officials would prioritize their programs and activities, and then fund higher priority activities at levels that ensured quality. In times of flat or declining budgets or financial constraints, institutions are expected to reallocate resources from lower

priority activities to higher priority activities, rather than reducing quality by funding lower priority activities at the same rate as higher priority activities.

Since 1992, OSU has taken the following program actions in response to APRA:

Program Review

OSU offers 246 degree and/or certificate programs as follows:

All of these programs were reviewed in the past five years with the exception of those programs with specialty accreditation. Programs with specialty accreditation are aligned with OSU's program review schedule as appropriate. Thus, if a professional program received a ten-year accreditation, it would not be reviewed for ten years, which is an approved exception to State Regents' policy.

Program Development Process

OSU's faculty developed the proposal, which was reviewed and approved by institutional officials. OSU's governing board approved delivery of the Bachelor of Science in American Studies at their June 16, 2017 meeting. OSU requests authorization to offer this program as outlined below.

POLICY ISSUES:

This action is consistent with the Academic Program Approval policy.

ANALYSIS:

Bachelor of Science in American Studies

Program purpose. The proposed program is designed with an interdisciplinary curriculum that will provide students with an understanding of American culture and society, as well as skills in critical thinking, information literacy, research, writing, and communication.

Program rationale and background. OSU currently offers a Bachelor of Arts (BA) in American Studies (416), which includes an option in Pre-Law, on both the Stillwater and Tulsa campuses. The proposed program would complement both the general BA program and the Pre-Law option and will attract students interested in the social, natural, mathematical, and human sciences. Overall, the demand for Bachelor of Science (BS) degrees in Tulsa is robust, with approximately 50 majors pursuing various BS degrees. Additionally, the proposed degree will support other programs at OSU Tulsa by encouraging increased enrollments in mathematical, computer, and human development and family sciences. Similar to students pursuing the BA in American Studies, students who earn the Bachelor of Science in American

Studies will be well-versed in general historical, political, social, and cultural knowledge about the United States and its diverse populations. Students will also gain experience with different methods of research and/or different objects of inquiry within the field. OSU also reports that a new transfer agreement has been established with Tulsa Community College's Associate in Arts in Liberal Studies (146) with an option in American Studies, which will also serve students interested in the BS program.

Employment opportunities. Requirements for the proposed program have been designed to prepare students for graduate research in the fields of Law, Economics, Social Research, and Social and Cultural Geography or for work in the areas of Social Work, Criminology, Non-Profit Management, and Teaching. According to the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission, career opportunities in many of the aforementioned areas are expected to increase as much as 18 percent through 2024. Additionally, Oklahoma is currently experiencing a teacher shortage. In 2015, the State Department of Education received 526 requests for emergency teaching certificates and another 318 in 2016. The proposed Bachelor of Science in American Studies will enable students to pursue alternative teacher certification in the field of Social Studies to meet this demand. OSU is confident students completing the proposed program will be successful in finding employment or gaining admission into graduate school.

Student demand. The proposed program is expected to meet the enrollment and graduation standards by the established deadline prior to final approval by the State Regents as shown in the following table.

Duplication and impact on existing programs. There are no Bachelor of Science in American Studies programs offered in Oklahoma. A system wide letter of intent was communicated by email on June 30, 2017. None of the State System institutions notified State Regents' staff of a protest to the proposed program. Approval will not constitute unnecessary duplication.

Curriculum. The proposed Bachelor of Science in American Studies program will consist of 120 total credit hours as shown in the following table. No new courses will be added and the curriculum is detailed in the attachment (Attachment A).

Faculty and staff. Existing faculty will teach the proposed program.

Support services. The library, classroom, and lab space are adequate for this degree program.

Financing. The proposed program will be offered on a self-supporting basis and the current tuition and fee structure will be sufficient to adequately fund the program. No additional funding is requested from the State Regents to support the program.

New Programs.

SUBJECT: University of Central Oklahoma. Approval to offer the Master of Arts in Museum Studies.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve the University of Central Oklahoma's request to offer the Master of Arts in Museum Studies, with the stipulation that continuation of the program will depend upon meeting the criteria established by the institution and approved by the State Regents, as described below.

• Master of Arts in Museum Studies. Continuation beyond Fall 2022 will depend upon meeting the following criteria:

Majors enrolled: a minimum of 15 students in Fall 2021; and Graduates: a minimum of 5 students in 2021-2022.

BACKGROUND:

Academic Plan

The University of Central Oklahoma's (UCO) 2017-2018 Academic Plan lists the following institutional priorities and new funding initiatives:

UCO is aggressively providing more learning spaces and enhancements to the physical environment. The Strategic Goal(s) tied to these activities is listed parentheses after each item. While there may be considerable overlap, the intent was to assess the primary impacts on each goal. Please see Appendix A for the four pillars and 12 strategic goals. Appendix B includes the Vision 2020. The current strategic goals have emerged out of a campus wide strategic planning initiative in 2012 and 2013.

- 1) Tenure-track faculty goal is to hire 80 TT faculty over the next 10 years. Eight positions will cost approximately \$642,528. (SGs 1, 2)
- 2) Continue to fund temporary full-time faculty from 2016-17. The return on investment for this cohort of lectures in 2016-17 was more than four times the cost. (SGs 1, 2)
- 3) Faculty compensation remains an issue in hiring and retaining faculty in certain fields. Invest in faculty salaries. (budget to be determined) (SG 8)
- 4) Continue to invest in UCO Downtown. This includes One Santa Fe (approx. \$500,000) for a remodel to provide space for faculty and staff who work downtown. (SG 11)
- 5) Request for an increase in operating budgets.
- 6) Tuition Waivers Increase waivers to recruit and retain talented students. (SG 7)
- 7) Capital projects (see facilities) Several projects are underway including the addition to Mitchell Hall, the new STEM building, and the addition to the Liberal Arts building. (SGs 3, 8, 10)

Facilities- This includes Academic and non-academic facilities.

- **Softball Complex.** Construction began June 2016 and was completed February 2017. The facility includes a new Team locker room, Coaches Office, Team Lounge and also new public toilet facilities to support the new 150 seat bleachers and Press box facility, new visitor and home team dugouts and new visitor and home team bullpen/batting cages in addition to a new artificial turf playing surface. (SG 10)
- **Murdaugh Hall.** This 80,000 square foot building was constructed in 1935-36 as the first Women's Residence Hall for the university. This is a major reconstruction of the building interiors and support systems that allows them to be brought up to current life and safety codes and will enhance the livability of the facility for students for years to come. Construction began May 2016 for completion and occupancy August 2017. (SG 10)
- Mitchell Hall Backstage Facility. This 20,000 square foot addition to our Mitchell Hall performance venue will serve multiple purposes for use including costume storage, theater rehearsal and dance studios, greenroom and dressing rooms, plus allow for classes to be taught for the various backstage professions in costume, design, performance makeup, costume fabrication and maintenance. Construction began December 2015 for completion June 2017. (SG 3, 8, 10)
- STEM Teaching and Research Center. This 55,000 square foot new building will contain multiple undergraduate research program spaces as well as house the College of Math and Science super computer, classrooms and an 80 seat secure storm shelter/auditorium. This facility will allow UCO students to be able to use current state of the art labs and scientific equipment in fields such as Forensic Science, Nursing, Biomedical Engineering, Computer Science, Biology, & Mathematics. Construction began February 2017 for completion fall 2018. (SGs 3, 5, 8, 10)
- South Central Plant. This project includes three elements, one to construct a new 6,500 square foot stand-alone building to house the new plant equipment. The second is to design and install the new chiller plant and controls systems and the third is to install the necessary underground piping loop to support the new chiller plant. The goal is to off load certain existing buildings from the north chiller plant and re-connect them to the south plant. This will allow greater redundancy and capacity in both plants and allow newly planned buildings such as the Dining Center and others to be connected to the north plant gaining operational cost efficiencies and energy savings. Construction began July 2016 for completion October 2017. (SG 10)
- College of Liberal Arts Addition. This 52,000 square foot addition to the current Liberal Arts Building will contain multiple transformative style classrooms, a large 200+ seat auditorium w/ storm shelter function, faculty offices, and a new community student area. Construction is to begin winter 2017-2018 for completion fall 2019. (SGs 3, 5, 8, 10)
- Campus Transportation and Parking. Construction of three new parking lots will begin June 2017 for completion fall 2017 to provide additional parking on the underserved west side of campus. (SG 10)
- New Dining Center. This 60,000 square foot building will contain 30,000 square feet of new student dining facilities for campus and that will seat approximately 560. The additional 30,000 square feet will include support spaces for Auxiliary Enterprises and other needed administrative support space and a multi-use open office area for use as temporary departmental swing space during renovations of other facilities. Construction is to begin February 2018 for completion fall 2019. (SGs 10)

• Athletic Complex:

• **Sports Performance Center.** Construction of the 41,000 square foot facility is to begin June 2017 for completion fall 2018 and will contain much needed support spaces for the Athletic programs at UCO to include weight and training areas, football locker room, a

- tutorial center, hydrotherapy and sports training area, coaches' offices, and administrative spaces for the Athletic department. (SG 10)
- North Hamilton Annex. Construction of the 26,000 square foot facility is to begin in summer 2018 with completion fall 2019. This facility will add new wrestling facilities as well as a much needed practice gymnasium for the Athletic teams, and locker rooms, and will also assist with Title IX compliance. (SGs 10, 12)

Academic Affairs operational priorities:

Note: This list reflects items identified at the Provost Cabinet Retreat in November 2016 as well as the University Planning Council (UPC) during the spring 2017 semester.

- Mandatory Cost Items (added to the mandatory cost request)
- Accreditation cost increase (\$19,900).
- Allocate funds to support the remodeling of the Santa Fe property in downtown Oklahoma City to support the metropolitan initiative and for the relocation of the UCO radio station: \$500,000
- Additional full-time faculty positions to bring UCO closer to its regional and metropolitan peer average.
- Temporary Lecture positions (AY 17-18 only): \$375,000 to fund 10 lectureships
- Fourteen additional temporary lecturer positions were funded by college course fees. We anticipate that many of these temporary lecturers will be funded in AY 2017-2018.
- Six Blended Learning Lectureships were funded by the *Center for eLearning and Connected Environments (CeCe)*. We anticipate that this will continue into AY 2017-2018.
- 5 Edu-Innovator temporary Instructor positions for FY17 were funded by the *Center for eLearning and Connected Environments (CeCe)*. Part of this program will continue. Negotiations and hiring are currently underway.
- To help bring the College of Business faculty to market levels differential tuition for all Business courses was increased by 6 percent.
- TL Scholars. The *Transformative Learning Scholars Program* is a faculty development initiative designed to promote student engagement in high impact practices while simultaneously developing opportunities to increase external funding. The pilot project began in fall 2014 with each college invited to recommend two to three faculty members. Scholars were provided funds for reassignment, travel, and undergraduate research assistant wages in exchange for developing and submitting a student-centered grant proposal to an external funding agency annually. There are currently 11 Scholars in the program, encompassing all of the academic colleges.
- In fall 2014, UCO instituted an Office of High Impact Practices (OHIP) to promote participation in, and improve financial support and coordination for, high-impact practices such as undergraduate research and global studies. The office oversees the Research, Creative, and Scholarly Activity (RCSA) Grant Program, which awarded 150 grants to students working with faculty mentors in 2016-17. The number of grants rose to 154 awards for 2017-18. The office also administers the Student Presentation Travel Grants, which awards funding for student travel to present at academic conferences. The office made 30 travel awards in 2016-17. In addition to the grant programs, the office coordinates participation in regional and national student conferences including Oklahoma Research Day, attended by 594 UCO faculty and students in 2017, and the National Conference on Undergraduate Research (NCUR), attended by 115 UCO students and faculty in 2017. Although the office's focus is undergraduate research, the intent is grow and develop programs so that it eventually supports student activities in a range of Transformative Learning areas. Towards this goal the office has been working on collaborative projects with the Centre for Global Competency, Experiential Learning, and the Living- Learning program. (SGs 2, 3, 4, 5)
- RCSA grants/Student travel. Several colleges have established funds to assist students in presenting research and creative achievement at professional conferences. In addition, the Office

- of High-Impact Practices has a Student Presentation Travel Grant program that awards up grants up to \$500 to pay for airfare for students accepted to present their research at a scholarly conference. Students are required to submit a grant application. Each student is sponsored by a faculty mentor. (SGs 1, 2, 5, 7, 8)
- STLR. The Student Transformative Learning Record (STLR) was launched in 2014 to track student progress, assess beyond-disciplinary learning outcomes, and collect artifacts of student engagement with Transformative Learning practices. STLR continues to benefit students: Fall 2015 to Fall 2016 first-time, full-time student retention and academic achievement correlate strongly to STLR engagement, with the near elimination of the achievement and retention gaps between targeted student populations (1st-generation, low-income, underrepresented) and nontargeted populations. UCO has continued its STLR scale-up, with more than 360 faculty (f-t and adjunct) trained in STLR by summer 2016. STLR student projects continue to be funded and popular, with impressive benefits to students occurring from their STLR project work with faculty and staff outside of the classroom: one example is the Hispanic Success Initiative (HSI), which has produced fall-to-fall retention among HSI students at 90 percent compared to the national average of around 50 percent. (Inclusion of Dr. Melissa Peet's Integrative Knowledge Portfolio Process as part of STLR activity for HSI, the Black Male Initiative, and GEARUP, has created a strong synergy that continues to amplify STLR results.) Notable during the past year has been continued expansion of STLR at other institutions adopting/adapting it to their needs: Western Carolina University, for example, adapted STLR to its co-curriculum as the focus of its SACS Quality Enhancement Plan. STLR in various forms now exists at multiple institutions in the U.S., Canada, and at one institution in New Zealand. As UCO moves forward on its 5-year Title III grant-supported implementation of STLR, the institution is on track for 100 percent deployment by September 2019. Aiding in the acceleration is yet another invitation (because of STLR) to a grant-funded project, the Quality Assurance Commons' Essential Employability Qualities (EEQ) initiative being funded by the Lumina Foundation. This latest invitation means STLR has attracted support from the Department of Education, the Gates/Educause Breakthrough Models Incubator, the Lumina Comprehensive Student Record project, and the Lumina EEQ initiative. (SGs 1, 2, 4, 5)

APRA Implementation

In August 1991, the State Regents launched the Academic Planning/Resource Allocation (APRA) initiative, which was based on the principle that institutional officials would prioritize their programs and activities, and then fund higher priority activities at levels that ensured quality. In times of flat or declining budgets or financial constraints, institutions are expected to reallocate resources from lower priority activities to higher priority activities, rather than reducing quality by funding lower priority activities at the same rate as higher priority activities.

Since 1992, UCO has taken the following program actions in response to APRA:

All of these programs were reviewed in the past five years with the exception of those programs with specialty accreditation. Programs with specialty accreditation are aligned with UCO's program review schedule as appropriate. Thus, if a professional program received a ten-year accreditation, it would not be reviewed for ten years, which is an approved exception to State Regents' policy.

Program Development Process

UCO's faculty developed the proposal, which was reviewed and approved by institutional officials. UCO's governing board approved delivery of the Master of Arts in Museum Studies June 22, 2017 meeting. UCO requests authorization to offer this program as outlined below.

POLICY ISSUES:

This action is consistent with the Academic Program Approval policy.

ANALYSIS:

Master of Arts in Museum Studies

Program purpose. The proposed program will provide students with the training and professional development needed for careers in museums, archives, historical organizations, national parks, corporate collections, and historic preservation programs.

Program rationale and background. The proposed program is currently offered as an option under the Master of Arts in History (111) and was listed on UCO's 2016-2017 Academic Plan with the intent to create a new stand-alone degree program. Over the past eight years, enrollment in the current option has more than doubled from eight students to 18 in 2015-2016. In light of the success of the current option and because Museum Studies is a distinct subfield within the discipline of History and does not share a common core with the main program, the Department of History and Geography proposes to create a stand-alone degree to better serve students and expand the program.

Employment opportunities. Career opportunities for graduates in Museum Studies remain strong in Oklahoma. According to Oklahoma Employment Security Commission data, the demand for Curators and Museum Technicians and Conservators is expected to increase as much as 17 percent through 2024. Local and regional demand for graduates in Museum Studies comes not only from museums such as the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum, the Oklahoma Historical Society, and the Gilcrease Museum, but also from a variety of for and non-profit organizations such as the Oklahoma Humanities Council and the Oklahoma Heritage Association. Recent graduates of the Museum Studies option have found positions at a variety of institutions, including the Oklahoma History Center, the Perot Museum of Nature and Science, and the Oklahoma Territorial Museum. Additionally, previous students enrolled in the current option have found internships throughout Oklahoma, as well as nationally and internationally, which has often led to a professional career. UCO is confident graduates will be successful finding employment.

Student demand. The proposed program is expected to meet the enrollment and graduation standards by the established deadline prior to final approval by the State Regents as shown in the following table.

Due to the program currently existing as an option within the Master of Arts in History (111), approval will not constitute unnecessary duplication.

Curriculum. The proposed Master of Arts in Museum Studies program will consist of 33 total credit hours as shown in the following table. Three new courses will be added and the curriculum is detailed in the attachment (Attachment A).

SUBJECT: Approval of institutional requests for program deletions.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve the following requests for program deletions as described below.

BACKGROUND:

Oklahoma State University (OSU) requests authorization to delete the program listed below:

• Certificate in Aerospace Security (472)

Seminole State College (SSC) requests authorization to delete the program listed below:

• Associate in Arts in Language Arts (209)

POLICY ISSUES:

These actions are consistent with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Academic Program Review policy.

ANALYSIS:

OSU requests authorization to delete the Certificate in Aerospace Security (472). This program was approved at the February 12, 2009 State Regents' meeting. OSU reports:

- A lack of student interest in the program.
- There are currently no students enrolled in the program.
- No courses will be deleted.
- No funds are available for reallocation.

SSC requests authorization to delete the Associate in Arts in Language Arts (209). This program was approved prior to 1990. SSC reports:

- The proposed deletion is due to low enrollment and graduates in the program.
- There are currently 12 students enrolled with an expected graduation date of Spring 2019.
- All major courses needed by the program will still be offered.
- No courses will be deleted.
- No funds are available for reallocation.

Oklahoma's Promise.

SUBJECT: FY2019 Official Funding Estimate for the Oklahoma's Promise Scholarship Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents provide to the State Board of Equalization a funding estimate of \$76.8 million for the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program for fiscal year 2019.

BACKGROUND:

Oklahoma's Promise was created by the Oklahoma Legislature in 1992. The program is designed to increase the education attainment level of Oklahoma's population by providing an incentive for more students to aspire for college, prepare themselves academically in high school, and ultimately earn college degrees.

Students from families with incomes of \$55,000 or less must enroll in the program in the 8th, 9th, or 10th grade. To earn the scholarship, students must complete a 17-course college preparatory curriculum, achieve at least a 2.50 GPA in the required core curriculum and a 2.50 GPA overall, attend school regularly, and refrain from drug abuse or delinquent acts. When the student begins college, a second family income check is required; the family income may not have increased to more than \$100,000. Students completing the requirements qualify for a scholarship equal to public college tuition. To retain the scholarship in college, students must meet certain GPA, conduct and academic progress requirements.

During the 2007 session, the Oklahoma Legislature passed SB 820 providing a dedicated funding source to ensure full and stable financial support for the program. The implementation of a dedicated funding source for the Oklahoma's Promise program was a long-standing legislative goal of the State Regents.

By statute, the State Regents must provide a funding estimate to the State Board of Equalization no later than November 1 of each year. The funding estimate is for the fiscal year that begins the following July 1. The seven-member State Board of Equalization is comprised of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, State Auditor and Inspector, State Treasurer, Attorney General, Superintendent of Public Instruction, and the President of the Board of Agriculture. The Board is responsible for certifying the total amount of funds that the Legislature can appropriate from the state's General Revenue Fund. The Board also has the responsibility to determine the amount of revenue necessary to fund the Oklahoma's Promise scholarships and subtract that amount from the total funds available for appropriation from the General Revenue Fund.

POLICY ISSUES:

The Oklahoma's Promise program plays an important role in the State Regents' goal to increase the proportion of Oklahoma's population earning a college degree, including the specific targets set by the Complete College America initiative supported by Governor Mary Fallin.

ANALYSIS:

2018-2019 Funding Estimate

Based on current data and projections, the funding estimate for the Oklahoma's Promise program in 2018-2019 is \$76.8 million. The number of students expected to receive an Oklahoma's Promise award in 2018-2019 is about 18,000.

Factors taken into consideration to calculate the estimate include:

- enrollment rates of 8th, 9th, and 10th grade students in the program
- the rate at which Oklahoma's Promise students complete the high school requirements to be eligible for the scholarship
- high school-to-college-going rates
- student enrollment patterns at colleges in Oklahoma
- their persistence/award-retention rates in college
- the number of college semester credit hours in which students enroll
- the tuition rates at each institution
- estimated tuition increases
- changes in institutional tuition policy such as flat-rate tuition structure


High School Student Enrollment in Oklahoma's Promise

The number of Oklahoma's Promise students enrolling in the program has been declining gradually since 2012. However, the rate of decline has lessened in the past two years. The 2018 high school graduating class is projected to be about the same as the 2017 graduating class at 8,300.

(By High School Graduation Year)





Oklahoma Family Income Data

The income limit for participation in Oklahoma's Promise was set at \$50,000 in 2000. From 2000 to 2016 the estimated percentage of Oklahoma families eligible to participate in the program declined from sixty-one percent in 2000 to forty percent in 2016. However, in 2017 the Oklahoma Legislature acted to increase the income limit to \$55,000 for students applying in 2017-2018. The Legislature also modified the statutory definition of "income" from "taxable and nontaxable income" to "federal adjusted gross income." These two changes are estimated to increase the percentage of Oklahoma families eligible to participate in the program from forty percent to forty-five percent.


Program Completion Rates of Oklahoma's Promise Students

Over the past four years the percentage of those enrolled students who successfully complete the program's high school requirements to be eligible for the scholarship has been increasing significantly. About seventy-two percent of Oklahoma's Promise students enrolled in the high school graduating class of 2017 are projected to complete the program requirements. The increased completion rate means that about 450 more 2017 graduates will receive the scholarship than would have if the completion rate had remained at sixty-five percent. It is projected that the completion rate will reach seventy-three percent for the class of 2018.

(by grad year)






High School Students Completing OKPromise Requirements




College-Going Rates






Full-Time College Enrollment

College Freshman to Sophomore Persistence Rates



Master Lease.

SUBJECT: Approval of listing of equipment projects for submission to the Council of Bond

Oversight for 2017D Equipment Program.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents authorize for submission to the Council of Bond Oversight the 2017D Equipment Master Lease Series. The total projects from one institution totaling approximately \$1.1 million.

BACKGROUND:

The Oklahoma State Legislature approved in May 1999, Senate Bill 151, which authorized the State Regents to establish a master lease program. State System entities may enter into lease agreements for projects having a project value of \$50,000 up to a maximum of \$10 million. The terms of the lease agreements will vary by the useful life of the equipment purchases.

The State Regents' office works in conjunction with the Oklahoma Development Finance Authority (ODFA) to administer this program with each institutional lease purchase agreement submitted to the Council of Bond Oversight for approval. The institutional governing boards will have given prior approval of all equipment purchases submitted under this program.

POLICY ISSUES:

Recommendation is consistent with current State Regents' policy.

ANALYSIS:

The Master Lease Purchase Program provides the State System entities a method of financing major personal property acquisitions at significant efficiencies from both financing aspects and administration. This program is designed to provide flexibility in acquiring new capital equipment by allowing lease purchase payments or debt service payments to be made on a monthly basis from current capital and operating funds. Individual sub-lease agreements will be entered into with each participating institution and the State Regents, under the terms of the Master Lease Purchase Agreement. The institution's fee structure shall be based on the individualized purchase package and interest rates available on the day of bond pricing.

The fourth series for 2017 includes one system institution with an estimated total of \$1.1 million in new equipment purchases and upgrades. The University will use Section 13 and New College funds to pay for the debt service. This project will be combined with two refunding projects from the previous 2007C Equipment issuance that will result in savings in interest expense for those projects. The following table summarizes this series of new project totals by institution.

Endowment.

SUBJECT: Approval of June 30, 2017 market values, distribution schedules and reports.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve a distribution of 4.5 percent of the June 30 market value totaling to the amount of \$24.07 million for fiscal year 2017, and \$11.16 million for prior years' carryover-- totaling approximately \$35.23 million-- for institutional expenditure from eligible Endowment Trust Fund accounts and approve the corresponding account reports for the year-ended June 30, 2017.

BACKGROUND:

With the allocation at the May 29, 2017 meeting, the State Regents have allocated a total of approximately \$417.5 million to the Endowment Trust Fund for chairs, professorships and lectureships and from state appropriations since inception of the program in 1988. The last several years' allocations are dedicated to bond debt service with the exception of the one-time transfer in FY2012 of 146.9 million from the EDGE Trust. The 2008 legislature increased the debt service for endowed chairs bonding authority by \$4,899,645. The current total allocation of \$11.5 million in state appropriations.

These allocations are to support the establishment of faculty chairs and professorships and for related activities to maintain the quality of instruction and research at colleges and universities in the State System. State Regents have also allocated \$30 million for the Langston University Endowment since 1999 and have completed the commitment with the FY2015 allocation. In addition to state funding, the trust fund contains some private matching funds and unrestricted gifts.

In September 2003, the endowment distribution policy was revised to allow for 4.5 percent of the three-year average market value at June 30 to be available for distribution. This revision became effective with the FY04 distribution. Also, included for the eighth year is the available distribution for the Langston University Endowment. It has been a long-standing practice that our distribution approval has included previous year's carryover funds. This item includes only one-half of those funds for available distribution for FY2018, as the earnings of the trust aren't sufficient to continue this practice at the full amount of the undrawn, cumulative carryover.

POLICY ISSUES:

Investments for the Endowment Trust Fund have been made in compliance with the State Regents' investment policy and relevant State Statutes.

STAFF ANALYSIS:

The market value of the trust fund was \$711.4 million, as of June 30, 2017. In FY17, the fund posted a gain of approximately 11.7 percent, in unitized asset value.

The State Regents' current investment policy provides that "the investment committee shall determine the distribution...The distribution will not necessarily be equivalent to actual earnings during the year, but to maintain a distribution rate from year to year that, as a goal, will approximate 4.5 percent of the asset values based on an average of the past three years for the endowment trust fund." The attached distribution schedule reflects the distribution available for each eligible Endowment Trust Fund account and is presented for approval.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents approve FY-2018 purchases for amounts that are in excess of \$100,000.

BACKGROUND:

Agency purchases are presented for State Regents' action. They relate to previous board action and the approved agency budgets.

POLICY ISSUES:

The recommended action is consistent with the State Regents' purchasing policy which requires State Regents' approval of purchases in excess of \$100,000.

ANALYSIS:

The items below are in excess of \$100,000 and require State Regents' approval prior to issuing a purchase order.

1) Copper River in the amount of \$125,000 for Adva Dense Wave Division Multiplexing (DWDM) node to be installed in Tulsa, OK. The optical node will provide fault tolerant connectivity to the University of Oklahoma Schusterman campus as well as access to the new Zayo fiber route built on Department of Transportation right of way from the Oklahoma/Kansas state line to McAlester. Costs associated with this purchase will be recovered from OneNet user fees. (Funded from 718-OneNet)

SUBJECT: Acceptance of CareerTech Carl Perkins Contract for 2017-2018.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents accept the agreement with the Oklahoma Board of Career and Technology Education for FY2018.

BACKGROUND:

For many years, the State Regents have entered into an annual agreement with the State Board of Career and Technology Education whereby certain State System institutions carry out programs and services of a technical education nature utilizing funds provided by the Department of Career and Technology Education.

POLICY ISSUES:

State law (70 O.S. 1991, Section 2264) provides for the State Board of Career and Technology Education (formerly Oklahoma Board of Vocational and Technical Education) to contract with the State Regents for the administration of the amount of funds set aside for supplementing the funding of postsecondary programs. The State Regents assume responsibility for allocation of the funds.

ANALYSIS:

The attached contract provides for the transfer of approximately \$4 million in state and federal funding from the Oklahoma State Board of Career and Technology Education to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education in exchange for services. The services provided by Oklahoma colleges and universities relate to the operation of Tech Prep programs, Carl D. Perkins programs and teacher inservice/professional development for CareerTech teachers, and Adult Education and Family literacy programs. Programs coordinated by the State Regents include data/information sharing.

Agreement Between THE OKLAHOMA STATE BOARD OF CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION and THE OKLAHOMA STATE REGENTS FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

2017-2018 Programs and Services

This Agreement is entered into by and between the State Board of Career and Technology Education, herein referred to as "State Board" and the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, herein referred to as "State Regents" in accordance with a Memorandum of Understanding pursuant to Senate Joint Resolution No. 35 of the First Session of the Thirty-Fourth Oklahoma Legislature (1973).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the State Board and the State Regents previously subscribed to a Memorandum of Understanding and Agreement regarding the necessity of cooperation of the two boards and their administrative offices as regards to their common responsibilities in the further development of career and technology education in Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, this Memorandum of Understanding and Agreement was validated by the First Session of the Thirty-Fourth Oklahoma Legislature in its enactment of Senate Joint Resolution No. 35 codified at 70 O.S. 2011, §§ 2251-2272; and

WHEREAS, this Memorandum and Legislative Resolution provided that the State Board will annually enter into an Agreement with the State Regents for supplemental funding of programs operated at institutions under the jurisdiction of the State Regents and will provide certain funding; and

WHEREAS, the State Board and the State Regents agree that the performance of this Agreement shall begin on the 1st day of July 2017 and will terminate no later than the 30th day of June 2018.

IT IS HEREBY STIPULATED AND AGREED by and between the State Board and the State Regents as follows:

*Funds in the amount of \$1,901,263 will be provided by the State Board for the purpose

- 3. The State Board of Career and Technology Education (ODCTE) desires to contract with the University of Central Oklahoma (UCO) and Oklahoma State University (OSU), and UCO and OSU desire to provide teacher in-service, professional development, coaching and mentoring for new CareerTech teachers. Not to exceed \$15,000 per university. Services may include but are not limited to instructional coaching/mentoring services. The staff of the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education and the appropriate institution staff will negotiate services provided during FY 2018
- The State Board will contract with OSU to assist new and alternative certified agricultural education teachers for the FY 2018 school year. The amount is not to exceed \$5,000.
- 5. The State Board will pay the State Regents \$50,000 to furnish information services and to provide information needed to further develop career and technical education. The State Board will provide a schedule of reports and data requests with respective due dates to the State Regents. The State Board will provide the State Regents staff with as much advance notice as possible for any additional information requests.
- The state Board will contract with Rogers State University to provide ALS psychomotor examinations to candidates seeking NREMT/OSDH certifications as Paramedics, Advanced EMTs, and Intermediate EMTs. The amount is not to exceed \$15,750.
- 7. The state Board's contribution is based upon contingencies that federal and state funding will be available for the support of programs at a level not less than the past fiscal year. In the event state and/or federal funding is decreased, the total amount will be revised proportionately.
- The State Board shall make payment under this Agreement upon presentation of an expenditure report on a quarterly basis by the higher education institutions identified in this Agreement.
- The institutions party to this Agreement will make reports to the State Board as necessary and appropriate.

- 10. Any additional services that the State Board wishes to have provided by the State Regents during FY 2018 will be negotiated by the staff of the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education working with each appropriate institution or agency of the state system to provide the needed services. Each such agreement for provisions of services shall be separately negotiated and added as an amendment to this Agreement. Under the terms of this Agreement, amendments will be provided to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education by the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education.
- *It is understood that in cases of the director and staff of the State Board making arrangements for certain line-item projects to be funded, the State Regents will not be able to assume the responsibility for fully accounting for the expenditure of the funds since the monies do not perfunctorily pass through the State Regents by virtue of this Agreement.

Administrative Rule Change.

SUBJECT: Posting of proposed suspension or Non-Renewal of Professional and Commercial Driver

Licenses Administrative Rule.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents authorize publication of a notice of intended rulemaking action to revoke the APA rule for the Suspension or Non-Renewal of Professional and Commercial Driver Licenses

BACKGROUND:

Senate Bill 357 was signed into law on April 25, 2017. The law repealed 70 O.S. 2011, Section 623.1, which was the statute that necessitated the related administrative rule 610 Chapter 25, Subchapter 25, Suspension or Non-Renewal of Professional and Commercial Driver Licenses. The law was enacted in 1996 as a collection tool for guaranteed student loans though the process was never utilized by the Oklahoma College Assistance Program (OCAP).

POLICY ISSUES:

Since the law authorizing the suspension or non-renewal of Professional and Commercial Driver Licenses was repealed the APA rule for the program is no longer required.

ANALYSIS:

The suspension or non-renewal of licenses was originally viewed as a possible collection tool. However, once enacted, it become apparent that it would result in a much more punitive process than what was already in place with OCAP's authority under federal regulation to pursue Administrative Wage Garnishment. Therefore, the suspension or non-renewal was not implemented as OCAP's ability to garnish wages of working individuals was viewed as more productive and less punitive than the suspension or non-renewal of licenses. Suspension or non-renewal of licenses could in fact make it more difficult for a defaulted borrower to repay if they were no longer able to work and earn wages in their licensed profession.

Since the process of suspension or non-renewal was never used by OCAP there will be no effect on current collection processes used by OCAP for defaulted student loans.

610:25-25-1. Purpose

The amendment of 70 O.S. 1991, § 623, by O.S.L. 1996, Ch. 261, § 1, necessitates the enactment of these rules procedures designed to provide those targeted by the amendment, namely the category of

defaulted student loan borrowers that both fail to enter repayment, and also hold or otherwise qualify for a professional license or certification, with:

- (1) An opportunity to establish repayment in lieu of loss of professional license or certification; and
- (2) Notice, hearing requirements and appeal procedures, as authorized by the amendment.

610:25-25-2. **Definitions**

- The following words or terms, when used in this Subchapter, shall have the following meaning, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:
- "License" means any professional license, certificate, registration, permit approval or similar document issued by a licensing board granting to an individual a right or privilege to engage in a profession, occupation or business, including Class A, B or C commercial driver licenses issued pursuant to Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes [70 O.S. § 623.1 (E)(2)].
- "Licensing board" means any bureau, department, division, board, agency or commission of this state or of a municipality in this state that issues a license [70 O.S., § 623.1 (E)(1)].
- "Reasonable and affordable monthly payment" means a determination of payment amount made by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE), pursuant to applicable federal regulations whereby assessment is made of licensee's disposable income and necessary expenses based on documentation provided by licensee that supports a smaller payment than is generally required of borrowers under the federal Higher Education Act of 1965 as amended.
- "Satisfactory repayment" is achieved when licensee has made six (6) consecutive, on time, voluntary, reasonable and affordable payments directly to OSRHE, pursuant to a written repayment agreement approved by OSRHE. Voluntary payments do not include payments obtained by income tax off set, garnishment, or income or asset execution. On time means received by OSRHE within fifteen (15) days of the scheduled due date.
- "Valid request for hearing" must be made within thirty (30) days of issuance of final notification, and shall explicitly state the reason for such request. Further, the stated reason(s) for the request must indicate clear relevance to the issue of whether licensee is in or will enter into satisfactory repayment. No extraneous or unrelated claims or issues, such as those regarding the validity of the debt, the quality of the education received, false certification, etc., will be addressed in a hearing pursuant to this Subchapter. Borrowers with such claims must resort to already established administrative remedies in a separate proceeding or forum.
- "Written repayment agreement" must be written and clearly state the total amount owed, the interest rate, down-payment amount, monthly payment amount, due dates for both down payment and regular monthly payments, duration of agreement, and any other terms of consideration for the agreement.

610:25-25-3. Notification procedure

(a) Initial notification.

- (1) Upon purchase of a default claim, Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) shall notify the defaulted borrower in writing that failure to pay satisfactorily, as defined by applicable federal regulation, may result in suspension or non-renewal of any professional license, certificate, registration, permit approval or similar document issued by a licensing board granting to an individual a right or privilege to engage in a profession, occupation or business, including Class A, B or C commercial driver licenses issued pursuant to Title 47 of the Oklahoma Statutes [70 O.S., § 623.1 (E)(2)].
- (2) If, after the initial notification, borrower fails to enter repayment or falls out of repayment, OSRHE shall continue collection efforts, informing the licensee in writing on a regular basis of the consequences of failing to repay, as prescribed by federal regulation, for a period of no less than sixty (60) days. Final notification may be issued by OSRHE only after it has attempted to collect the defaulted loan for sixty (60) days.

(b) Final notification.

- (1) OSRHE shall provide a final notification letter allowing an additional thirty (30) days prior to notification of the licensing board. The final notification shall provide the defaulted student loan borrower with an administrative process to challenge issuance of notification of default to licensing board.
- (2) The final notification shall be mailed to the licensee's last known address and shall describe the nature and amount of the debt, the intention of OSRHE to notify the appropriate licensing board and an explanation of the licensee's rights.
- (3) The final notification shall state that the licensee's professional license, certification, registration, permit approval or similar document issued by a licensing board granting to an individual a right or privilege to engage in a profession, occupation or business, including Class A, B or C commercial driver licenses, shall be suspended and/or not renewed by the licensing board thirty (30) days after OSRHE's mailing of the notice to licensee's last known address, unless within that time the licensee:
- (A) pays the balance due as stated in the notice,
- (B) enters into a written repayment agreement approved by the OSRHE, or
- (C) appears and shows cause in a hearing before a hearing official that suspension or non-renewal of a license is not appropriate.
- (4) For purposes of this Subsection, in absence of evidence to the contrary, a licensee shall be considered to have received the final notification, five (5) days after issuance by OSRHE. [Source: Added at 14 Ok Reg 168, eff 10-15-96 (emergency); Added at 14 Ok Reg 1424, eff 5-12-97]

610:25-25-4. Written repayment agreement executed subsequent to final notice-

- (a) Any written repayment agreement referred to in this procedure shall clearly state the total amount owed, the interest rate, down payment amount, monthly payment amount, due dates for both down payment and regular monthly payments, duration of agreement, and any other terms of consideration for the agreement (which terms may include requirement that licensee provide current employment and salary information, as well as tax information, and submit to semi-annual or annual reviews).
- (b) Written repayment agreements executed subsequent to OSRHE's issuance of the final notice but prior to notification of the appropriate licensing board shall:
- (1) be signed by licensee or licensee's legally authorized representative, and
- (2) become effective only upon OSRHE's receipt of licensee's down payment, which sum shall be equivalent to three (3) monthly payments and shall be paid to OSRHE in cash, money order or certified funds.
- (c) Written repayment agreements executed subsequent to notification of any applicable licensing board or subsequent to suspension of any applicable license shall:
- (1) be signed by licensee or licensee's legally authorized representative, and
- (2) become effective only upon OSRHE's receipt of licensee's down payment, which sum shall be equivalent to six (6) monthly payments and shall be paid to OSRHE in cash, money order or certified funds.
- (d) OSRHE may, at its discretion, agree to accept a down-payment amount less than the amount required under (b) or (c) of this Section after review of licensee's total documented financial circumstances.

610:25-25-5. Repayment agreement default

- (a) Where the licensee enters a written repayment agreement subsequent to OSRHE's final notification and commits to certain terms in consideration for OSRHE's agreement to forbear notification of licensing boards, the failure of the licensee to meet his/her obligations under the agreement, at any time, for the duration of the agreement, may result in immediate notification of default to licensing board without further notice to licensee.
- (b) For purposes of this Section, the licensee shall be considered to have breached or failed to meet his/her obligations under the agreement upon becoming two (2) payments delinquent.

(c) OSRHE may, at its discretion, and under appropriate circumstances as prescribed by applicable federal regulation, temporarily suspend collection efforts including, but not limited to, notification of any licensing board.

610:25-25-6. Hearing procedure

- (a) To show cause why suspension or non-renewal of a license would not be appropriate, the licensee shall request a hearing from OSRHE. The request shall be made in writing and within thirty (30) days of OSRHE's issuance of the final notice and shall explicitly state the grounds or reason(s) for the request for hearing. For purposes of this paragraph, in absence of evidence to the contrary, a licensee shall be considered to have received the final notice five (5) days after said notice was issued by OSRHE.

 (b) A valid request for hearing must be made within thirty (30) days of issuance of the final notice and shall explicitly state the reason(s) for such request. Further, the stated reason(s) for the request must indicate clear relevance to the issue of whether licensee is in or will enter into satisfactory repayment. No extraneous or unrelated claims or issues, such as those regarding the validity of the debt, the quality of the education received, false certification, etc., will be addressed in a hearing pursuant to this section.

 Borrowers with such claims must resort to already established administrative remedies in a separate proceeding or forum.
- (c) Upon receipt of a request for hearing, OSRHE shall evaluate whether the hearing request is valid. Invalid requests shall be summarily denied by OSRHE and returned to licensee with statement of denial.
- (d) If licensee submits a valid request for hearing, OSRHE may exercise discretion in attempting to resolve the matter to the mutual satisfaction of both parties prior to the involvement of an independent hearing official.
- (e) When licensee's valid request for hearing, as described in (b) of this Section, is received by OSRHE, OSRHE may **not** issue notification to the appropriate licensing board until licensee has been provided the requested hearing.
- (f) The time and location for the hearing with the independent hearing official shall be established by OSRHE. An oral hearing may, at the licensee's option, be conducted by telephone conference. OSRHE shall schedule all hearings with the hearing official and mail written notification of date and time of hearing to licensee allowing licensee at least ten (10) days' notice. Licensee shall bear any costs associated with travel to and from a hearing under this Section. Further, parties shall bear their own attorney fees.
- (g) Should a hearing with an independent hearing official be conducted, at the request of the licensee, the only issues that may be determined in such hearing are whether the licensee is in satisfactory repayment and/or whether licensee will enter into repayment. Possible determinations of the hearing official are, therefore, limited to the following:
- (1) Hearing official may determine that licensee is in satisfactory repayment and that OSRHE is prohibited from notifying licensing board of licensee's defaulted student loan so long as licensee maintains that status.
- (2) Hearing official may determine that licensee will enter satisfactory repayment status and may issue a determination that licensee must sign a written repayment agreement.
- (A) Hearing official may specify terms for said agreement, but in no instance shall hearing official specify terms that may violate any federal or state law.
- (B) Terms specified by the hearing official shall not extend statutory repayment period or create any impossibility of repayment in full within the applicable repayment period.
- (C) So long as licensee complies with the terms, OSRHE is prohibited from notifying licensing board.
- (D) Should licensee fail to meet his/her obligations under the agreement specified by the hearing official, OSRHE may proceed with notification of licensing board without further notice to licensee.
- (3) Hearing official may determine that licensee is not and will not enter satisfactory repayment status and that suspension or non-renewal of his/her license is appropriate and, accordingly, issue determination that OSRHE proceed with notification of licensing board.

- (h) A copy of hearing official's written determination shall be mailed to licensee on the day of issuance or at the earliest practicable date thereafter. Determinations of hearing official become final ten (10) days after issuance of written determination.
- (i) Hearing official must, in all respects, strictly comply with all requirements of 34 C.F.R. § 682. [Source: Added at 14 Ok Reg 168, eff 10-15-96 (emergency); Added at 14 Ok Reg 1424, eff 5-12-97]

610:25-25-7. Procedure for notification of licensing board to suspend and not renew

- (a) If the licensee fails to respond to a final notice of intent to order the suspension or non-renewal of a license within the prescribed time, fails to timely request a hearing, or fails to appear at a regularly scheduled hearing, the licensee's defenses, objections, or request for a payment plan shall be considered without merit and OSRHE may immediately proceed with notification of licensing board.
- (b) When OSRHE determines that the licensee is in default, as defined by applicable federal regulation, is not in satisfactory repayment, or has not entered into a written repayment agreement, and the thirty (30) day final notification period has elapsed, or hearing official's determination that notification of licensing board should occur has become final, it may notify any licensing board that a licensee is in default on a student loan obligation.
- (c) Pursuant to 70 O.S., § 623.1 (B), upon receipt of the notice, the licensing boards shall suspend and not renew the license of the licensee until further notification by the OSRHE.
- (d) Once so notified, no further administrative review or contested proceeding within the licensing board is required. No licensing board may be held liable for any suspension or nonrenewal of a license or commercial driver license pursuant to the provisions of this act [70 O.S., § 623.1 (C)].

610:25-25-8. Procedure for appeal of hearing official's decision-

- (a) Upon written request by the licensee, the decision of the hearing official may be appealed to OSRHE. Licensee's written request for appeal must be received by OSRHE on or before the day that the determination of the hearing official becomes final (ten [10] days after issuance of written decision).
- (1) An appeal shall be reviewed by an OSRHE employee(s) whose employment responsibilities do not include the collection of defaulted student loans.
- (2) If licensee establishes to the satisfaction of OSRHE with verifiable and documented evidence that suspension, non issuance or non renewal of a license would create a significant hardship to the licensee, to the licensee's employees, to legal dependents residing in the licensee's household, or the persons, businesses, or other entities served by the licensee, OSRHE may provide one additional opportunity for the licensee to establish a satisfactory written repayment agreement.
- (3) OSRHE may grant a new hearing if reconsideration is warranted based on verifiable and documented evidence of material, procedural irregularity.
- (4) After review of all pertinent documentation, OSRHE shall issue a final written determination regarding appeal of hearing official's decision at the earliest practicable date but not later than thirty (30) days after OSRHE's receipt of appeal request.
- (A) Subject review may, but need not, include direct oral communication with licensee.
- (B) Under circumstance where OSRHE upholds decision to proceed with notification of licensing board, OSRHE shall mail copy of its written determination to licensee and may not proceed to notification of licensing board until ten (10) days after copy of written determination is mailed to licensee.
- (5) The determinations of OSRHE, pursuant of this Section, are final agency decisions.
- (b) Nothing in this Section shall be construed to prevent post-suspension reconsideration, rehearing or reopening, at the discretion of OSRHE, for good cause shown by licensee.
- (c) Under appropriate circumstances, as prescribed by federal regulation, OSRHE may temporarily suspend all collection efforts, including but not limited to, notification of licensing board.
- (d) Employees of OSRHE must, in all respects, strictly comply with all requirements of 34 C.F.R. § 682, and all other federal and state laws.

610:25-25-9. Procedure for notification of licensing board to renew or terminate suspension

- (a) OSRHE shall notify each licensing board, as soon as possible and no later than ten (10) business days, to renew or terminate suspension of license, when OSRHE determines:
- (1) that the licensee is no longer in default status due to repayment in full, loan rehabilitation or some other action that discharges the licensee of responsibility for repayment; **or**
- (2) when the licensee achieves satisfactory repayment status, which, pursuant to federal regulation, is defined as:
- (A) licensee has made six (6) consecutive, on-time, voluntary, reasonable and affordable payments directly to OSRHE pursuant to a written repayment agreement approved by OSRHE;
- (B) the required monthly amount may not be more than is reasonable and affordable based on the borrower's total, documented, financial circumstances;
- (C) voluntary payments do not include payments obtained by income tax off-set, garnishment, or income or asset execution;
- (D) on time means received by OSRHE within fifteen (15) days of the scheduled due date; or
- (3) when licensee executes a written repayment agreement and, in compliance with the requirements for a written repayment agreement executed subsequent to notification of licensing board as provided in this Section, remits a down payment equivalent to six (6) monthly payments.

SUBJECT: Posting of proposed Oklahoma's Promise – Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program

Rule Revisions.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents post proposed permanent rule revisions for the Oklahoma's Promise – Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program (Oklahoma's Promise) and initiate the process for adoption of permanent rule revisions as described below.

BACKGROUND:

Oklahoma's Promise was created in 1992. Students must enroll in the program in the 8th, 9th, or 10th grade. The program requires students to complete a 17-unit core curriculum, achieve at least a 2.50 GPA in the core curriculum and a 2.50 GPA overall, attend school regularly, and refrain from drug abuse or delinquent acts. Students completing the requirements qualify for a scholarship equal to public college tuition. Participation is limited to students from families with an income of \$55,000 or less at the time of application to the program. The student's family income must also not exceed \$100,000 when the student begins college. SB 529 of the 2017 legislative session made several significant changes to the program which are described in the Analysis section below.

POLICY ISSUES:

Oklahoma's Promise plays an important role in the efforts of Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education to increase the number of college graduates in Oklahoma. The program is designed as an incentive to encourage more students to aspire for college, prepare themselves for academic success in college, and to provide them with financial assistance for college expenses.

ANALYSIS:

The proposed rule revisions are primarily related to statutory changes made in SB 529 that was passed during the 2017 legislative session. The changes related to SB 529 include:

Increasing the Application Income Limit: The income limit at the time of application in the 8th-10th grades is increased from \$50,000 to \$55,000 effective for 2017-2018. In addition, the definition of "income" is changed from "taxable and nontaxable" to "federal adjusted gross income" (AGI). The bill further increases the income limit to \$60,000 AGI beginning in 2021-2022. The change to \$55,000 is estimated to increase the percentage of Oklahoma families eligible to participate in the program from forty percent to forty-five percent and could potentially add 800-1000 participants to each high school graduating class of students. The first high school students enrolling under the new higher income limit will graduate in 2020. Consequently, the first year of fiscal impact for this change will be FY 2020-2021.

Applying the Second Income Limit Each Year in College: Beginning in 2018-19, the \$100,000 second income limit will be checked each year the student is in college. Previously, the second income limit was checked only one time when the student started college. In 2018-2019, there will be no "grandfathering" of students who were already enrolled in college. Recent data indicates that 350-400 Oklahoma's Promise college students in their sophomore through senior years have incomes over \$100,000 and will be disqualified. In addition, about five percent of Oklahoma's Promise college students in their sophomore through senior years currently do not complete the federal financial aid application (FAFSA – Free Application for Federal Student Aid) which is used to verify income. These students will be required to complete the FAFSA and if their income is over \$100,000 will be disqualified. This change is expected to save approximately \$1.5 million per year.

<u>Eliminating Award Payment for Remedial Courses:</u> Beginning with the 2018-2019 academic year, the program will no longer pay for noncredit remedial courses. Two recent initiatives should help address student remedial needs.

- Many colleges and universities are moving toward addressing student remediation needs through credit-earning co-requisite courses that allow the student to earn college credit while simultaneously receiving the supplemental academic services they need.
 (b)
- The Oklahoma State Department of Education, in partnership with the State Regents, the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education, and the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB), is implementing a College Career Math Ready course for high school seniors who intend to go to college and who have already completed Algebra 1, Geometry, and Algebra II, but have scored below a 19 on the math section of the ACT test.

Capping the Number of Credit Hours for which the Scholarship Will Pay in College: SB 529 requires the State Regents to establish a maximum limit on the number of courses (credit hours or other postsecondary units) to which the scholarship will apply. Beginning with students graduating high school in 2017-18, the proposed revisions would set a general limit of 129 credit hours with exceptions granted for students enrolled in degree programs that require more than 129 credit hours (including first-time professional degrees that do not require an undergraduate degree, such as pharmacy). Following is additional information related to this recommendation.

- Most undergraduate degrees require either 120 credit hours (about thirty percent) or 124 credit hours (about fifty percent). The 129 credit hour limit will provide a limited amount of flexibility for students who change majors during their college career.
- About ten percent of college degrees require in excess of 129 credit hours. These include many engineering degrees and education degrees specializing in science and music. Some undergraduate architectural engineering programs require up to 157 credit hours.
- Data from Complete College America shows that, on average, students completing bachelor degrees take about five years and complete about 135 credit hours.
- Oklahoma's Promise program data shows that about one percent of award expenditures is for courses taken after a student has accumulated 150 credit hours.

• The proposed limit would not include college credit hours earned by the student, but not paid for by Oklahoma's Promise, including high school concurrent enrollment, Advanced Placement, College-Level Examination Program (CLEP), etc.

Authorizing More Postsecondary Career Technology Programs: SB 529 expands the number of programs at career technology centers for which the Oklahoma's Promise award may be used. Previously, the statute limited participation to only career technology programs offered within a cooperative agreement between a technology center and a state system college. The new statute authorizes the award to be used for any career technology program that is eligible to participate in federal student financial aid programs. This change makes the Oklahoma's Promise award consistent with other state and federal financial aid such as the Oklahoma Tuition Aid Grant (OTAG) and the federal Pell Grant. It is estimated that the change will increase the number of Oklahoma's Promise award recipients at career technology centers by about 100.

Aligning Scholarship Retention Requirements with Institution Degree-Completion Standards: SB 529 replaces a unique and confusing statutory college GPA requirement with the requirement that the student meet the institution's academic retention and degree-completion standards. The previous statute required students to achieve at least a 2.5 GPA calculated only on courses taken after the student had accumulated 60 credit hours. Since this GPA was different from the student's cumulative GPA as shown on their transcript, it was difficult and cumbersome for students to monitor.

Title 610 - State Regents for Higher Education

Chapter 25 - Student Financial Aid and Scholarships

Subchapter 23 – Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program

610:25-23-1. Purpose

The Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program, created by the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Act passed in 1992 (70 O.S. § 2601 et seq.), is designed to help provide access to postsecondary education opportunities for students with financial need who have demonstrated a commitment to academic success in high school. The program shall also be known as "Oklahoma's Promise". The Act identifies two primary purposes:

- (1) The first is to ensure that students who satisfy the requirements of the program, and who pursue an associate or baccalaureate degree in Oklahoma at an accredited public or private institution, or pursue studies in a postsecondary <u>career technology</u> program or <u>course offered through a cooperative agreement between a public technology center and an institution of The Oklahoma State System for Higher Education that meets the requirements to be eligible for federal student aid and is offered by a technology center school supervised by the State Board of Career and Technology Education, are relieved of the burden of paying:</u>
 - (A) undergraduate resident nonguaranteed tuition at institutions of The Oklahoma State System for Higher Education;
 - (B) tuition for enrollment in postsecondary programs or courses of a public technology center, not to exceed the amount the student would have received for comparable enrollment at a two-year institution within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education; or
 - (C) some portion of fees or tuition at a private institution of higher education in Oklahoma accredited pursuant to 70 O.S. § 4103.
- (2) The further purpose of the program is to establish and maintain a variety of support services whereby a broader range of the general student population of this state will be prepared for success in postsecondary endeavors. [70 O.S. § 2602]

610:25-23-2. Eligibility of participants

Eligibility to participate in the program must be established by both the student and his/her parent(s), custodial parent(s), or guardian(s). Students enrolled in the eighth, ninth or tenth grade at a public or private school and whose parents' income meets the financial need criteria are eligible to apply to become a program participant. Students educated by other means who are between the ages of thirteen (13) and fifteen (15) are eligible to apply to become a program participant. Eligibility requirements to participate in the program include the following:

- (1) The student must be a resident of the state of Oklahoma or be enrolled in a school district located in this state that serves students who reside in both this state and an adjacent state pursuant to a contract as authorized in Section 5-117.1 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes; and
- (2) The student's parent(s), custodial parent(s), or guardian(s) must establish financial need.
 - (A) To meet the program's financial need criteria, the income of the student's parent(s) from taxable and nontaxable sources shall not exceed \$50,000 per year at the time the student applies for participation in the program. Beginning in 2017-2018, the federal adjusted gross income of the student's parent(s) shall not exceed \$55,000 per year at the time the student applies for participation in the program. Beginning in 2021-2022, the federal adjusted gross income of the student's parent(s) shall not exceed \$60,000 per year at the time the student applies for

participation in the program. A student who was adopted while in the permanent custody of the Department of Human Services, in the court-ordered custody of a licensed private nonprofit child-placing agency, or federally recognized Indian tribe, as defined by the federal Indian Child Welfare Act, shall not be subject to the determination of financial qualification at the time the student applies for participation in the program.

- (B) Parents of students making application to the program must use one of the following options to establish financial need eligibility:
 - (i) Documentation of their most recent calendar (tax) year income. Parents of tenth-grade applicants may use the calendar (tax) year income that coincides with the spring semester of the tenth-grade if the application is submitted by the required deadline; or
 - (ii) Documentation of current yearly income from an officially approved application for free or reduced price school meals or other state or federal means-tested programs as determined by the State Regents. The State Regents may limit use of this option to pilot projects as determined by the State Regents. If requested by the State Regents, parents may be required to provide additional documentation of income.
 - (iii) The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education shall review the determination of financial need eligibility of the student as set forth in section (2)(A) above if the income from taxable and nontaxable sources of the student's parent(s) includes income received from nontaxable military benefits or income received from the federal Social Security Administration due to the death or disability of the student's parent(s). If the income from taxable and nontaxable sources of the student's parent(s), excluding income received from nontaxable military benefits or income received from the federal Social Security Administration due to the death or disability of the student's parent(s), does not exceed the limitations set forth in section (2)(A) above, Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) per year, the student shall be determined to have met the financial need eligibility [70 O.S. § 2605(D)(3)(6)]
- (C) For students that are subject to court-ordered joint custody arrangements, the OSRHE shall use guidelines consistent with regulations for federal Title IV student financial aid programs to determine which parent(s) shall meet the financial need criteria.

610:25-23-3. Applications [no changes]

610:25-23-4. Program requirements [no changes]

610:25-23-5. Securing Program benefits

- (a) To qualify for the program benefits for the first semester or other academic unit of postsecondary enrollment, the participant must:
 - (1) Be a resident of this state both at the time of application to the program and at the time the student graduates from high school, or have been enrolled in a school district located in this state that serves students who reside in both this state and an adjacent state pursuant to a contract as authorized in Section 5-117.1 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
 - (2) Have graduated within the previous three (3) calendar years from a high school or other educational program if homeschooled. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) may award benefits for a student's first semester or other academic unit of postsecondary enrollment taken more than three (3) calendar years after the student graduates from high school, or other educational program if homeschooled, if the student is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States, the Reserve Corps of the Armed Forces of the United States, or the Oklahoma National Guard, and is ordered to active duty or active duty for special work or training and due to the duty

commitment the student is unable to enroll prior to the end of the three-year period. Such three-year period shall be extended by the length of the term of duty.

- (3) Have a record of satisfactory compliance with the agreements and program requirements described in 610:25-23-4. Students failing to comply with the agreement and program requirements shall not be eligible for awards. Compliance shall be verified by the local contact person upon a form provided by the OSRHE. Final verification of compliance shall be determined by the OSRHE. A copy of the student's final high school transcript shall be submitted by the local contact person with the student's verification form.
- (4) Have satisfied admission standards as established by the OSRHE for first-time-entering students for the appropriate type of institution (OSRHE policy on Institutional Admission and Retention) or, if attending a private institution, satisfy the admission standards determined by the private institution; provided, that no student participating in the program shall be admitted into an institution of higher education by special admission standards.
- (5) Have secured admission to, and enrolled in, an institution which is a member of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, a postsecondary <u>career technology</u> program <u>that meets the requirements to be eligible for federal student financial aid and is offered by a technology center school supervised by the State Board of Career and Technology Education pursuant to a duly approved cooperative agreement between a public technology center and an institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, or a private institution of higher learning located within this state and accredited pursuant to Section 4103 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.</u>
- (6) Be a United States citizen or lawfully present in the United States. This provision shall not apply to any student that was enrolled in the program prior to the end of 2006-07 2006-2007 school year.
- (b) For students receiving the program benefit award for the first time in 2012-2013 2012-13 and thereafter through 2017-2018, at the time the student begins postsecondary education and prior to receiving any program benefit award, the federal adjusted gross income of the student's parent(s) shall not exceed \$100,000 per year. Beginning with the 2018-2019 academic year, prior to receiving any Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program benefit award for any year during which the student is enrolled in an eligible institution, the federal adjusted gross income of the student's parent(s) shall not exceed \$100,000 per year. The determination of financial qualification as set forth in this paragraph shall be based on the income of the student, not the income of the parent(s), if the student:
 - (1) is determined to be independent of the student's parents for federal financial aid purposes,
 - (2) was in the permanent custody of the Department of Human Services at the time the student enrolled it the program, or
 - (3) was in the court-ordered custody of a federally-recognized Indian tribe, as defined by the federal Indian Child Welfare Act, at the time the student enrolled in the program.
- (c) A student who was adopted while in the permanent custody of the Department of Human Services, in the court-ordered custody of a licensed private nonprofit child-placing agency, or federally recognized Indian tribe, as defined by the federal Indian Child Welfare Act, shall be subject to the following financial qualification at the time the student begins postsecondary education and prior to receiving any program benefit award:
 - (1) For a student adopted between birth and twelve (12) years of age, the federal adjusted gross income of the student's parent(s) may not exceed \$150,000 per year.
 - (2) For a student adopted between thirteen (13) and seventeen (17) years of age, the federal adjusted gross income of the student's parent(s) may not exceed \$200,000 per year.
 - (3) If the student is determined to be independent of the student's parents for federal financial aid purposes, the determination of financial qualification shall be based on the income of the student, not the income of the parent(s).
- (d) Award recipients shall apply for financial aid at the institution in which they enroll.
- (e) <u>Beginning in 2018-2019 and thereafter, all All</u> students eligible to receive the program benefit award for the first time in 2012-13 and thereafter must complete an application for federal student financial aid (Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA) or its equivalent each year the student is enrolled in

<u>postsecondary education</u>. Students not eligible to complete the FAFSA <u>will may</u> be provided an alternate method by the OSRHE. Income information submitted through the FAFSA, or an alternate method if necessary, shall be used to determine compliance with the income limits described in sections (b) and (c) above. <u>Any falsified or incomplete information submitted by the student or parent(s) may result in the student's disqualification from the program.</u>

(f) Any person incarcerated in a state, federal, or private correctional facility shall not be eligible to receive program benefits.

610:25-23-6. Retaining eligibility in postsecondary education

- (a) To retain eligibility for program benefits while pursuing a program of higher learning in an institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, the student shall maintain good academic standing and satisfactory academic progress according to standards of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE). Students attending an eligible private institution shall maintain good academic standing and satisfactory academic progress according to the standards of the institution in which they are enrolled. [70 O.S. § 2603; OSRHE policy on Institutional Admission and Retention]
- (b) Effective January 1, 2008, any student receiving the program benefit award that is expelled or suspended for more than one semester from an institution of higher education for conduct reasons shall permanently lose eligibility for program benefits.
- (c) Students shall meet the requirements for retention and degree completion as established by the institution in which the student is enrolled. [70 O.S. § 2603] For students receiving the program benefit award for the first time in 2012-13 and thereafter, the student must achieve a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.00 on a 4.00 scale or its equivalent for courses taken through the student's sophomore year and achieve a minimum grade point average of 2.50 on a 4.00 scale or its equivalent for courses taken during the student's junior year and thereafter.
 - (1) Any Oklahoma's Promise student with a cumulative grade point average of less than 2.00 upon the completion of sixty (60) earned semester credit hours, or its equivalent, shall permanently lose eligibility for program benefits. The cumulative grade point average at the end of the enrollment period during which the student completes their sixtieth (60th) earned semester credit hour, or its equivalent, shall be calculated by the institution in which the student is enrolled to determine compliance with this provision. The institution shall notify the OSRHE if the student fails to meet this requirement.
 - (2) To remain eligible for the award, an Oklahoma's Promise student must also achieve a 2.50 cumulative grade point average for courses taken after the completion of sixty (60) earned semester credit hours, or its equivalent. The first check of this grade point average requirement will be conducted by the institution in which the student is enrolled at the end of the enrollment period during which the student completes their ninetieth (90th) earned semester credit hour, or its equivalent. The grade point average calculation shall include all earned semester credit hours, or their equivalent, starting with the enrollment period immediately following the enrollment period during which the student completed their sixtieth (60th) earned semester credit hour, or its equivalent. Thereafter, the institution in which the student is enrolled shall check the cumulative grade point average for courses taken after the completion of sixty (60) earned semester credit hours, or its equivalent, at the end of each enrollment period. Any student whose cumulative grade point average at the required check points is below 2.50, shall be ineligible for program benefits until the cumulative grade point average for courses taken after the completion of sixty (60) earned semester credit hours or its equivalent is raised to 2.50 or above. Any period of ineligibility for failure to meet the requirements of this provision shall count against the student's maximum time period of award eligibility.
 - (3) For institutions within the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, the student's grade point average shall be calculated using the methodology defined as "Cumulative Grade Point Average" in the OSRHE policy on grading.

(d) Beginning in 2012-2013 2012-13, all Oklahoma's Promise students receiving the award in college will be required to meet federal satisfactory academic progress (SAP) standards as defined by the institution in which they are enrolled. This requirement is in addition to the statutory GPA requirement described in section (c) above and will apply to all Oklahoma's Promise award recipients whether or not they are receiving federal student financial aid. Any Oklahoma's Promise student that is ineligible to receive federal financial aid due to failure to meet SAP standards will also be ineligible to receive the Oklahoma's Promise award.

610:25-23-7. Payment of awards; policies and limitations

- (a) Eligible students enrolled at an institution in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education shall have an award equivalent to their undergraduate resident nonguaranteed tuition paid to the institution on the student's behalf by an allocation from the Oklahoma Higher Learning Trust Fund [70 O.S. § 3953.1];
- (b) Eligible students enrolled in a duly accredited private Oklahoma institution of higher education [70 O.S. § 4103] shall have awards paid to the institution on the student's behalf by an allocation from the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Trust Fund in an amount equivalent to the average undergraduate resident nonguaranteed tuition if the student were enrolled in a comparable institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education. Comparability of institutions shall be determined by the OSRHE;
- (c) Eligible students enrolled in a postsecondary <u>career technology</u> program <u>that meets the requirements</u> to be eligible for federal student financial aid and is offered by a technology center school supervised by the State Board of Career and Technology Education through a cooperative agreement between a public technology center and an institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education shall have an award equivalent to tuition paid, not exceeding the average amount the student would have received for comparable enrollment at a two-year institution within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, to the school or institution on the student's behalf by an allocation from the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Trust Fund;
- (d) Funds shall be transferred by the OSRHE from the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Trust Fund to the institution in which the student is enrolled. No funds shall be paid directly to the student;
- (e) Payment will not be allowed for courses taken in excess of those required for a baccalaureate degree;
- (f) Beginning with students graduating high school in 2017-2018 and thereafter, payment will be limited to 129 semester credit hours, or the equivalent, except as provided in the following. Students enrolled in a baccalaureate degree program that requires in excess of 129 semester credit hours or the equivalent, may receive payment for the number of semester credit hours required by the degree program. Students without a baccalaureate degree who are enrolled in a first professional degree program that does not require completion of a baccalaureate degree and that requires in excess of 129 semester credit hours or the equivalent, may receive payment for the number of semester credit hours required by the degree program up to a maximum of 150 semester credit hours or the equivalent. The Chancellor may approve exceptions to the limit for extraordinary or hardship circumstances including, but not limited to, sickness and injury.
- (g) Students will be eligible for the benefits outlined in this policy for five (5) years from the first date of postsecondary enrollment. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education may award the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program benefits for courses of postsecondary units taken more than five (5) years after the student's first semester of postsecondary enrollment only in hardship circumstances; provided, however, no Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program participant may receive benefits beyond a cumulative time period of five (5) years [70 O.S. § 2604]. Hardship circumstances may include, but are not limited to, sickness, injury, required military service, or service required by the student's religious or cultural traditions;
- (g)(h) There will be no limit to the number of awards other than the amount of funds available or the number of eligible students. If sufficient funds are not available to provide awards for all eligible applicants, the OSRHE shall make awards on the basis of need;

- (h)(i) Students who have previously received awards shall have priority over students applying for initial awards;
- (i)(j) The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education shall take into consideration other grants and scholarships received by an eligible applicant when making awards [70 O.S. § 2604]. Award recipients may not receive financial aid in excess of his/her cost of attendance as determined by the institution in which the student is enrolled. The cost of attendance determined by the institution shall be consistent with regulations for federal Title IV student financial aid programs. If necessary, an award shall be reduced by an amount which makes the student's total financial aid equivalent to the student's identified cost of attendance.
- (k) Beginning with the 2018-2019 academic year, an award shall not include payment for noncredit remedial courses.

610:25-23-8. Administrative responsibilities [no changes]

610:25-23-9. "Heroes Promise"

HB 1343 of the 2011 Oklahoma legislative session amended the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Act to authorize certain persons to participate in the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program and to qualify for the program benefits. This category of program participation shall be referred to as the "Heroes Promise" program. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the administrative rules of the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program shall apply to participants in the Heroes Promise program.

- (1) Eligibility: A student shall be eligible to participate in the Heroes Promise program if the student meets the following criteria:
 - (A) The student is a child of any person killed after January 1, 2000, in the line of duty in any branch of the United States Armed Forces or who died after January 1, 2000, as a result of an injury sustained while in the line of duty in any branch of the United States Armed Forces and the person who was killed or died filed an individual or joint Oklahoma income tax return for the tax year prior to the year during which the person was killed or died.
 - (B) The student is a resident of Oklahoma or is enrolled in a school district located in this state that serves students who reside in both this state and an adjacent state pursuant to a contract as authorized in Section 5-117.1 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
 - (C) The student executes an agreement to participate in the program.
- (2) Application and Enrollment:
 - (A) Eligible students enrolled in a public or private school in the eighth-, ninth-, or tenth-grade, and eligible students educated by other means between the ages of thirteen (13) and sixteen (16) may apply to participate in the program.
 - (B) Eligible students who have completed the tenth grade or who have reached age sixteen (16) shall be given the opportunity to apply to participate in the program prior to reaching the age of twenty-one (21).
 - (C) An eligible student shall not be required to establish financial need as described in 610:25-23-2(2).
 - (D) To apply, the student and/or their parent, custodial parent, or guardian shall submit appropriate documentation of eligibility including, but not limited to:
 - (i) A copy of an individual or joint Oklahoma income tax return filed by the parent of the student for the tax year prior to the year during which the parent was killed or died.
 - (ii) Documentation of the parent's death after January 1, 2000 while in the line of duty or as a result of injury sustained while in the line of duty in any branch of the United States Armed Forces.
 - (iii) Documentation that the student is a resident of Oklahoma or is enrolled in a school district located in this state that serves students who reside in both this state and an adjacent

- state pursuant to a contract as authorized in Section 5-117.1 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
- (3) Exemption from Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program Requirements: Students eligible for the Heroes Promise program shall not be subject to the program requirements contained in 610:25-23-4 (Program requirements).
- (4) Securing Program Benefits: An eligible student may qualify for a Heroes Promise award which includes payment of an amount equivalent to resident tuition or other tuition pursuant to Section 2604 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes for the first semester or other academic unit of postsecondary enrollment if the student meets the following criteria:
 - (A) The student has satisfied admission standards as determined by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education for first-time-entering students for the appropriate type of institution, or, if attending a private institution, has satisfied admission standards as determined by the private institution. No student participating in the Heroes Promise program shall be admitted into an institution of higher education by special admission standards.
 - (B) The student has secured admission to, and, prior to reaching the age of twenty-one (21), has enrolled in an institution which is a member of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, a postsecondary vocational technical career technology program that meets the requirements to be eligible for federal student financial aid and is offered by a technology center school supervised by the State Board of Career and Technology Education pursuant to a duly approved cooperative agreement between a technology center school and an institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, or a private institution of higher learning located within this state and accredited pursuant to Section 4103 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education may award the Heroes Promise benefit for a student's first semester or other academic unit of postsecondary enrollment taken after the student turns twenty-one (21) years of age if the student is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States, the Reserve Corps of the Armed Forces of the United States, or the Oklahoma National Guard, and is ordered to active duty or active duty for special work or training and due to the duty commitment the student is unable to enroll before the student reaches twenty-one (21) years of age. The period of the extension shall be the length of the term of duty.
 - (C) Except as otherwise provided in this section, students eligible for the Heroes Promise award benefits shall not be subject to the provisions of 610:25-23-5 (Securing Program benefits).
 - (D) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the payment of Heroes Promise award benefits shall be subject to the provisions of 610:25-23-7 (Payment of awards; policies and limitations).
 - (E) A student that qualifies for the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program benefit based on both their Heroes Promise eligibility and completion of the regular program requirements shall only receive a single program benefit.
- (5) Retaining Eligibility in Postsecondary Education: To retain eligibility for the Heroes Promise award while pursuing a program of higher learning at an eligible Oklahoma institution, the student must maintain compliance with the provisions of 610:25-23-6 (Retaining eligibility in postsecondary education).

Administrative Rule Change.

SUBJECT: Posting of proposed permanent rule revisions to the Academic Scholars program.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents post proposed permanent rule revisions for the Academic Scholars Program and initiate the process for adoption of permanent rule revisions as described below.

BACKGROUND:

The Academic Scholars Program was established in 1988 by the Oklahoma Legislature and provides scholarships to academically outstanding students who attend an Oklahoma college or university. The program is intended to keep Oklahoma's best high school students in Oklahoma for college and to attract quality nonresident students to Oklahoma institutions. Both Oklahoma residents and nonresident students can qualify for the program by achieving designation as a National Merit Scholar, National Merit Finalist or United States Presidential Scholar. Oklahoma residents may also qualify by scoring at or above the 99.5 percentile on the ACT or SAT. In 1999, legislation authorized a category called "Institutional Nominees" which allowed public colleges and universities to submit a limited number of scholarship nominees based upon minimum criteria established by the State Regents and the institution.

The program provides participants funding to use toward tuition, fees, room and board, and required textbooks or materials for up to four (4) years of undergraduate and graduate study, at accredited institutions of higher education in Oklahoma. The annual award amounts for all National Merit & ACT/SAT qualifiers are \$5,500 for students attending a research university, \$4,000 for students attending a regional university, and \$3,500 for students attending a community college. The annual award amounts for Institutional Nominees were \$2,800 for students attending a research university, \$2,000 for students attending a regional university, and \$1,800 for students attending a community college. In addition to the cash award paid by the program, public institutions provide tuition waiver scholarships. In 2016-2017, about 2,400 students participated in the program receiving awards totaling approximately \$10.7 million.

POLICY ISSUES:

The Academic Scholars Program was created by the Oklahoma Legislature as an incentive for students with high academic ability to attend college in Oklahoma. The statutes identify three specific goals:

- To retain top-ranked Oklahoma students in the state and allow Oklahoma colleges and universities to compete aggressively for these students.
- To attract high caliber out-of-state students to Oklahoma colleges and universities.
- To enhance the academic quality of Oklahoma colleges and universities.

ANALYSIS:

The proposed rule revision would limit the ability of nonresident student participants to transfer their scholarship to another institution. Due to state funding reductions over the past several years, the State Regents have acted to reduce the funding of scholarships for nonresident students participating in the program. Effective with the 2018-2019 academic year, no funding will be provided for nonresident student scholarships. Institutions may continue to accept nonresident students into the program but are responsible for paying the scholarship cost from institutional funds. To prevent the potential unfunded scholarship obligation from being transferred to another institution that did not initially award the scholarship, the proposed rule change would require the nonresident student wishing to transfer the scholarship to receive approval from the institution to which they intend to transfer.

Chapter 25 - Student Financial Aid and Scholarships

Subchapter 1 - Academic Scholars Program

Section 610:25-1-1. Purpose [no change]

Section 610:25-1-2. Definitions [previously revoked]

Section 610:25-1-3. General principles for operation of program [no change]

Section 610:25-1-4. Eligibility Requirements and Term of Scholarship Award

- (a) There are five avenues by which to qualify for the Academic Scholars Program. Each is defined below:
 - (1) An Individual Applicant Qualified Student, which shall mean a student who is a resident of the State of Oklahoma whose ACT test score or whose Scholastic Aptitude Test score falls within the 99.5 to 100.0 percentile levels as administered in the State of Oklahoma and whose grade-point average and/or class rank is exceptional, as determined by the State Regents,
 - (2) A Presidential Scholar, which shall mean a student selected by the Commission on Presidential Scholars pursuant to the Presidential Scholars Program administered by the United States Department of Education,
 - (3) A National Merit Scholar, which shall mean a student designated as a National Merit Scholar by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation,
 - (4) A National Merit Finalist, which shall mean a student designated as a National Merit Finalist by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation,
 - (5) An Institutional Nominee, which shall mean a student nominated by an institution in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education whose ACT test score or whose Scholastic Aptitude Test score falls within the 95.0 to 99.49 percentile levels, or who shows exceptional academic achievement as evidenced by factors including but not limited to grade point average, class rank, national awards, scholastic achievements, honors, and who shows exceptional promise based on documentation that may include but not be limited to teacher recommendations, extracurricular activities, and evidence of overcoming economic and social obstacles as determined by the State Regents. The State Regents shall ensure that standards of high academic ability are documented. Scholarship awards to institutional nominees become effective when appropriate documentation is verified by the State Regents.
 - (A) Effective with the Fall 2006 semester, Institutional Nominees are required to meet at least one of the two minimum criteria outlined below to be considered eligible for application as an Institutional Nominee:
 - (i) Research universities:
 - (I) ACT: 32 or SAT equivalent
 - (II) GPA 3.9 and either Top 2 percent Class Rank or rank of first or second in their graduating class
 - (ii) Regional universities:
 - (I) ACT: 30 or SAT equivalent

- (II) GPA 3.8 and either Top 4 percent Class Rank or rank of first or second in their graduating class
- (iii) Two-year colleges:
 - (I) ACT: 29 or SAT equivalent
 - (II) GPA 3.7 and either Top 5 percent Class Rank or rank of first or second in their graduating class
- (B) Students graduating from high schools that do not provide class rank and home-educated students shall be considered for eligibility as an Institutional nominee based on their ACT or SAT test scores.
- (C) Students are eligible for consideration as an Institutional Nominee no later than the fall semester immediately following the graduation of their high school class. The Chancellor may approve exceptions to this requirement for extraordinary circumstances.
- (D) Institutional Nominees may be Oklahoma residents or nonresidents.
- (E) Students receiving the scholarship as an Institutional Nominee of a two-year college are eligible for transfer to a four-year public or private Oklahoma institution after completion of an associate's degree or the accumulation of at least 48 credit hours. In addition, the Institutional Nominee of a two-year college must attend the nominating institution for the first year.
- (F) Students receiving the scholarship as an Institutional Nominee of a four-year university are eligible for transfer to another Oklahoma institution after one year of attendance at the nominating institution.
- (G) For any year that the State Regents provide less than full funding of the total cost of all awards for nonresident students participating in the program, nonresident students may transfer the scholarship to another institution only upon approval of the institution to which they intend to transfer.
- (H) Students who fail to enroll the first semester upon nomination forfeit their scholarship eligibility. (H) (I) Institutions may not replace students who forfeit their scholarship or are removed from the program due to failure to meet continuing eligibility requirements with another nominee.
- (b) Students receiving the scholarship are eligible for eight semesters of scholarship at Oklahoma colleges and universities. Additional semesters of award, up to ten semesters, are available upon approval by the President or appropriate academic officer of the institution and the Chancellor. Additional semesters are intended only for extraordinary circumstances or for undergraduate academic programs that cannot be completed within eight semesters.

POLICY ISSUES:

Suspending a program is consistent with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Academic Program Review policy. Institutions have three years to reinstate or delete suspended programs. Students may not be recruited or admitted into suspended programs. Additionally, suspended programs may not be listed in institutional catalogs.

ANALYSIS:

OUHSC requested authorization to suspend the Doctor of Public Health in Public Health (007).

- OUHSC reports the curriculum does not address new accreditation criteria and needs time to obtain adequate resources and revise courses.
- This suspension is effective beginning the 2017-2018 academic year.
- OUHSC will reinstate or delete the program by October 31, 2020.

USAO requested authorization to suspend the Bachelor of Arts in American Indian Studies (024).

- USAO reports low enrollment and graduates for the program for the past 3 years.
- This suspension is effective beginning the 2017-2018 academic year.
- USAO will reinstate or delete the program by October 31, 2020.

OSU's governing board approved offering via online delivery the existing Bachelor of University Studies in University Studies (025) at their June 16, 2017 meeting. OSU requests authorization to offer this existing program via online delivery, as outlined below.

POLICY ISSUES:

This action is consistent with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Distance Education and Traditional Off-Campus Courses and Programs policy. This policy allows institutions with approved online delivered programs or grandfathered status to request programs through an abbreviated process. The process calls for the president to send the following information to the Chancellor: 1) letter of intent, 2) the name of the program, 3) delivery method(s), 4) information related to population served and demand, and 5) cost and financing.

ANALYSIS:

OSU satisfactorily addressed the requirements in the Distance Education and Traditional Off-Campus Courses and Programs policy as summarized below.

Bachelor of University Studies in University Studies (025)

Demand. For the majority of the fastest growing professions, postsecondary education is required for employment. In 2015, the Georgetown Center for Education and Workforce stated that in Oklahoma 67 percent of jobs will require a long-term certificate or some college and 37 percent will require a college degree. With the flexibility of the curriculum, offering the Bachelor of University Studies (BUS) in University Studies (025) in an online format will allow students to tailor their education to meet the employment demands in a variety of workforce areas. The BUS in University Studies (025) is a multidisciplinary degree designed for goal-directed, motivated, and mature students who find the present degree programs at OSU will not enable them to attain their educational or career objectives. Currently,

the BUS in University Studies (025) has an average enrollment of 102 students and 114 graduates, indicating a high demand for the program. Once approved for online delivery, students accepted to pursue the BUS in University Studies (025) will work with an advisor to identify eligible program areas that use distance education methods to develop a plan of study that will best suit their educational and career goals. OSU believes that online delivery of the program will allow them to better serve current students as well as attract new students who want to meet the growing demand for qualified employees in various career fields.

Delivery method. Courses used to complete the degree may be offered synchronously or asynchronously. The primary method for delivering online courses will be Desire2Learn (D2L). Major features of D2L that will facilitate learning include: email, the ability to post content, online discussions, a drop box for submission of and feedback on assignments, group work, quizzes, and a gradebook. Supplemental methods for the delivery of online content may include video-capable tools such as Skype. The library, facilities, and equipment are adequate for this degree program.

Funding. The existing program will be funded through existing allocations and the tuition and fee structure, and no new funding from the State Regents will be required to deliver the existing degree program through online delivery.

Duplication and impact on existing programs. A system wide letter of intent was communicated by email on May 4, 2017. The University of Oklahoma (OU) requested a copy of the proposal, which was sent July 31, 2017. Neither OU nor any other State System institution notified State Regents' staff of a protest to the proposed delivery method of the existing program. Approval will not constitute unnecessary duplication.

October 19, 2017

AGENDA ITEM #17-d:

College Admission.

SUBJECT: Ratification of a request to approve a high school course for college admission.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents ratify a request to approve a high school course for college admission.

BACKGROUND:

Since Fall 2010, the State Regents' high school curricular requirements for college admission have included four units of English, three units of mathematics, three units of laboratory science, three units from history and citizenship skills, and two units from the subjects listed above or selected from computer science, foreign language, or any Advanced Placement course except applied courses in fine arts.

The State Regents have a statutorily mandated function regarding high school courses that satisfy college admission curricular requirements. 70 O.S. § 11-103.6 outlines the curricular units or sets of competencies that are required to graduate from an Oklahoma public high school. By virtue of this statute, high school courses that satisfy college admission requirements, which are subject to State Regents' approval, also satisfy high school college preparatory/work ready curriculum graduation requirements. On March 3, 2016, the State Regents revised the Institutional Admission and Retention policy to align with 70 O.S. § 11-103.6 by designating the State Regents as the responsible entity for approving courses for college admission.

Based on the extended time periods between State Regents' meetings during certain points of the year, relying on the State Regents to approve high school courses for college admission could significantly delay the timeframe in which courses are approved. Therefore, to make the approval process more efficient, on March 3, 2016, the State Regents delegated authority to the Chancellor to approve high school courses for college admission, pending State Regents' ratification.

POLICY ISSUES:

The provision regarding the State Regents' role in approving high school courses for college admission, which is detailed within policy section 3.9.3 of the State Regents' Institutional Admission and Retention policy, reads as follows:

"Additionally, 70 O.S. § 11-103.6 outlines the curricular units or sets of competencies that are required to graduate from an Oklahoma public high school. By virtue of this statute, high school courses that satisfy college admission requirements, which are subject to State Regents approval, also satisfy specific college preparatory/work ready curricular high school graduation requirements. Therefore, if a high school or the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education wishes to determine if a course will satisfy a

college admission curricular requirement, which fits within one of the legislatively defined college preparatory/work ready curricular subject areas, but is not explicitly detailed therein, it shall require State Regents approval."

STAFF ANALYSIS:

Prior to October 19, 2017, State Regents' staff received a request from Chouteau High School (CHS) to approve high school courses for college admission. The table below details the course as well as the college admission subject area in which CHS requested the course count:

After a comprehensive review of the course objectives and learning outcomes, it was determined that this high school course meets the requirement for college admission. Therefore this high school course was approved for college admission by the Chancellor. State Regents' ratification is requested.

State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement.

SUBJECT: Ratification of institutional requests to renew participation in the State Authorization

Reciprocity Agreement.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents ratify institutional requests for annual renewal of participation in the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement.

BACKGROUND:

The State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) is an agreement among member states, districts and territories that establishes comparable national standards for interstate offering of postsecondary distance education courses and programs. SARA offers an opportunity to expand educational offerings to postsecondary students in the state – and to promote affordability by reducing the compliance burden and associated costs on home state institutions that seek to expand their distance education offerings. SARA participation is voluntary for states and institutions and is intended to make it easier for students to take online courses offered by postsecondary institutions based in another state.

SARA is administered by the four regional higher education compacts (Midwestern Higher Education Compact, New England Board of Higher Education, the Southern Regional Education Board and the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education) and the Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) is the compact to which Oklahoma belongs.

On May 29, 2015, the State Regents approved Oklahoma's participation in SARA. Additionally, on June 29, 2015, the Southern Regional Education Board approved Oklahoma as a SARA State.

As the state portal agency, the State Regents are responsible for the initial approval and ongoing oversight of SARA activities which are performed by Oklahoma public and private institutions. Based on the extended time periods between State Regents' meetings during certain points of the year, relying on State Regents' approval to permit eligible institutions to participate in SARA would delay the timeframe in which institutional participation in SARA is approved or renewed. Therefore, on September 3, 2015, the State Regents approved a revision to the Administrative Operations policy that delegates authority to the Chancellor to approve eligible institutions to participate in SARA, pending State Regents' ratification.

POLICY ISSUES:

Section 3.16.9 in the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Distance Education and Traditional Off-Campus Courses and Programs policy states the eligibility requirements for SARA as follows:

"To be eligible for SARA participation, a public or private institution shall have its principal campus or central administrative unit domiciled in Oklahoma and be a degree-granting institution that is accredited by an agency recognized by the USDE. Additionally, a private institution shall have the minimum requisite USDE issued financial responsibility index score, on the most recent year's review, to participate in the SARA. Private institutions which do not attain the required requisite financial responsibility score on the most recent year's financial review, but receive a score within the range which NC- SARA permits states to grant provisional acceptance, may seek conditional approval."

STAFF ANALYSIS:

Prior to October 19, 2017, State Regents' staff received SARA renewal applications from the institutions listed below:

- Carl Albert State College;
- Mid-America Christian University;
- Oklahoma City Community College;
- Oklahoma Wesleyan University; and
- Tulsa Community College.

As a result of meeting the SARA eligibility requirements, these institutions were approved by the Chancellor for annual renewal of their participation in SARA. State Regents' ratification is requested.

Agency Operations.

SUBJECT: Ratification of Purchases in excess of \$25,000 for FY2017.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents ratify purchases in amounts in excess of \$25,000 but not in excess of \$100,000 between August 16, 2017 and September 25, 2017.

BACKGROUND:

Agency purchases are presented for State Regents' action. They relate to previous board action and the approved agency budgets.

POLICY ISSUES:

The recommended action is consistent with the State Regents' purchasing policy which provides for the Budget Committee's review of purchases in excess of \$25,000.

ANALYSIS:

For the time period between August 16, 2017 and September 25, 2017, there are XX purchases in excess of \$25,000 but not in excess of \$100,000.






The requests are consistent with State Regents' policy which requires:


- conferral of honorary degrees only at the highest level for which an institution is authorized to award earned degrees;

SUBJECT: Acceptance of the Fall 2017 Preliminary Enrollment Survey.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the State Regents accept the Fall 2017 Preliminary Enrollment Report.

BACKGROUND:

Since 1941, enrollment data have been collected and reported by the State Regents for Oklahoma higher education institutions. Beginning in 1981, the Unitized Data System (UDS) was used to collect enrollment and other data at the end of each semester and to report unduplicated official enrollments. The original enrollment survey continues to collect preliminary enrollment that can be reported near the beginning of each semester. The purpose of this report is to summarize the fall 2017 preliminary enrollments and to compare fall 2017 preliminary enrollments to the previous year.

POLICY ISSUES:

This activity is consistent with the State Regents' reporting responsibilities.

ANALYSIS:

- The headcount enrollment at Oklahoma public colleges and universities decreased by 1.6 percent from 179,082 in fall 2016 to 176,253 in fall 2017. Research universities increased 0.2 percent from 57,986 to 58,111; liberal arts universities increased 3.9 percent from 850 to 883; regional universities decreased 3.3 percent from 52,385 to 50,664 and community colleges decreased 1.9 percent from 67,861 to 66,595 (Table 1).
- The headcount enrollment at private institutions decreased 3.1 percent from 24,726 in fall 2016 to 23,970 in fall 2017 (Table 1).
- The <u>semester</u> FTE enrollment at public institutions decreased 1.1 percent from 132,873 in fall 2016 to 131,347 in fall 2017 (Table 2).
- The <u>semester</u> FTE enrollment at private institutions decreased 3.9 percent from 21,605 in fall 2016 to 20,755 in fall 2017 (Table 2).
- The number of first-time entering students decreased 2.2 percent from 31,843 in fall 2016 to 31,141 in fall 2017 at Oklahoma public institutions. The research universities increased 4.1 percent from

8,354, to 8,693. The liberal arts universities increased 53.6 percent from 209 to 321. Public regional universities decreased 1.7 percent from 7,661 to 7,529. The community colleges decreased 6.5 percent from 15,619 in fall 2016 to 14,598 in fall 2017 (Table 3).

- The number of first-time entering decreased 3.2 percent from 4,170 to 4,035 at the private institutions (Table 3).
- Concurrent headcount enrollment at Oklahoma public institutions increased 5.3 percent from 9,900 in fall 2016 to 10,422 in fall 2017 (Table 4).
- The number of concurrent semester credit hours increased 6.9 percent from 50,446 in fall 2016 to 53,925 in fall 2017. The average number of credit hours **per** student rose slightly from 5.1 in 2016 to 5.2 in 2017 (Table 4).

The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) held their regular meeting at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, September 7, 2017, in the State Regents' Conference Room at the State Regents' offices in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Notice of the meeting had been filed with the Secretary of State on October 13, 2016. A copy of the agenda for the meeting had been posted in accordance with the Open Meeting Act.

MINUTES OF THE COMMITTEE-OF-THE-WHOLE Wednesday, September 6, 2017

- 1. ANNOUNCEMENT OF FILING OF MEETING NOTICE AND POSTING OF THE AGENDA IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE OPEN MEETING ACT. The Committee-of-the-Whole met at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, September 6, 2017, in the Regents Conference Room at the State Regents' offices in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Notice of the meeting was filed with the Secretary of State on October 13, 2016 and revised on September 1, 2017. A copy of the agenda had been posted as required by the Open Meeting Act.
- **2. CALL TO ORDER.** Participating in the meeting were Regents Toney Stricklin, Ron White, Ann Holloway, Andy Lester, Jeff Hickman, Mike Turpen and John Massey. Regent Jay Helm joined the meeting at 10:37 a.m. Regent White called the meeting to order and presided.
- **3. RESEARCH.** Secretary of Science and Technology Dr. Kelvin Droegemeier gave a brief presentation on the University of Oklahoma's (OU) National Weather Center (NWC) and the role higher education plays in research. Dr. Droegemeier began by stating that in 1960 the OU Department of Physics received a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to establish a Meteorology program and in 1962 the Weather Radar Laboratory was established at OU. Over the last 50 years, the NWC has become a confederation of 13 companies employing 800 people with over \$90 million in yearly research and is the largest meteorology program in the nation. The NWC's research strengths include the number of private companies on their campus, their advanced radars, the ability to predict forecasts and the use of OneNet providing networking services.
 - Dr. Droegemeier stated that computer models used to be the primary source of information for all weather forecasts but they could sometimes be very inaccurate. For instance, in March 2000 an F3 tornado hit Fort Worth, Texas but the computer model showed no precipitation or thunderstorms in the area. In 1989, OU created the Center for Analysis and Prediction of Storms with a grant from the NSF and set out to solve this problem. Using radar data, the NWC created ensemble forecasts, several forecasts merged together to predict the probability of precipitation. Today, the NWC is using ensemble forecasts nationally and can predict very specific storms, sometimes 24 hours ahead of time. Dr. Droegemeier finished by stating that the NWC has installed NEXRAD radar that helps them see what's happening at ground level, not just in the sky and they will also begin manufacturing their own radars in late 2017.
- **4. EXECUTIVE SESSION.** Regent Holloway made a motion, seconded by Regent Helm, to enter executive session for confidential communications between the board and its attorneys concerning pending investigations, claims, or actions. Voting for the motion were Regents White, Holloway, Lester, Hickman, Turpen, Massey, Helm and Stricklin. Voting against the motion were none.

Following executive session discussions, Regents returned to open session.

5. BUDGET REPORT AND REVENUE UPDATE. Vice Chancellor for Budget and Finance Amanda Paliotta stated that the Oklahoma Supreme Court ruled the new cigarette tax to be unconstitutional and that may have an impact on the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher

Education's budget. Additionally, she stated that the she received a request from the Oklahoma Senate fiscal staff to submit an agency impact scenario for a 3.17 percent midyear budget reduction.

6. **LEGISLATIVE UPDATE.** Vice Chancellor for Governmental Relations Todd Pauley gave a brief update on legislative activity. He stated that OneNet hosted a tour of their facilities, the Data Operating Center and the Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences mobile telemedicine unit for a group of legislators. He stated that the tour was very successful and left a positive impression with the attendees. Additionally, there are several interim studies coming up that will focus on higher education such as: agency consolidation, cyber technology, and concurrent enrollment.

7. TASK FORCE REPORTS.

- a. **Online Education Task Force.** Vice Chancellor Blanke stated that the next meeting of the Online Education Task Force will be September 7, 2017 and they will have a year-end summary, discussion on the renewed contract with NextThought, and future plans.
- b. **State Regents Safety and Security Task Force.** Associate Vice Chancellor Angela Caddell updated the Regents on the status of the Campus Safety and Security Task Force. She stated that the task force is currently working to ensure campuses have free or low cost training opportunities, creating a speakers bureau in coordination with the Council on Student Affairs, and beginning preparation for the Campus Safety and Security Summit next fall.
- **8.** "BEST OF HIGHER EDUCATION" REPORT. Regents received the September 2017 update on institutional activities via e-mail.
- 9. CALENDAR OF EVENTS. Chancellor Glen D. Johnson discussed several upcoming events:
