Academic Scholars Program (ASP)

Academic Scholars Program (ASP)

- Established in 1988
- Oklahoma's Merit Based Scholarship
 Program
- Open to high school seniors planning

to attend any Oklahoma college.

ASP Qualifications and Awards

- How does a student qualify for ASP?
 - National Merit Scholars*
 - National Merit Finalists*
 - Presidential Scholars*
 - Oklahoma Test Takers at or above the 99.5 percentile on the ACT or SAT
 - Institutional Nominee*

*Funding for nonresident participation eliminated

ASP Qualifications and Awards

Institutional Nominees will be required to meet at least one of the three minimum standards listed in the table below:

ACT Superscore Impact

Automatic Qualifiers

Oklahoma high school seniors can use their "superscore" to meet the ACT score requirement to automatically qualify for the program.

ASP Qualifications and Awards

Institutional Nominees \$3,500 at Research Universities \$2,700 at Regional Universities \$2,500 at Community Colleges

Automatic Qualifiers \$6,000 at Research Universities \$4,500 at Regional Universities \$4,000 at Community Colleges

State system institutions also provide the scholarship recipient a tuition waiver.

ASP Qualifications and Awards

Retention Requirements

- Full-time Enrollment Each Semester
- Maintain at least a 3.25 Cumulative GPA
- Complete at least 24 Credit Hours Each Year

Administrative Rules

- Maintained by the Office of Administrative Rules of the Oklahoma Secretary of State
 - On the site, enter "academic scholars program" in the search box.

- A student must enter the program the fall semester immediately after his/her class graduates from high school
- Renewable for eight semesters
- Additional semesters available only for extraordinary circumstances or undergraduate academic programs that cannot be completed in eight semesters

The guidelines shown below will be used to review requests for extensions to the eight-semester limit on Academic Scholars awards :

<u>Summer Semester</u>

To receive payment for enrollment in a summer term, the student must submit the summer term application to the **State Regents' office by the application deadline**

Transfer Rules

- <u>Two-Year College</u>
 - IN must complete associate's degree or 48 credit hours to transfer to a four-year university.
 - IN must attend nominating college for the 1st year.
- Four-Year University
 - IN must attend nominating university for the 1st year
- <u>Graduate Transfer</u>
 - Scholars can request to use remaining semesters of eligibility for professional or graduate school

Leave of Absence

- Students may take a leave of absence if not enrolled
- Studying abroad
 - Student can take a leave of absence or request scholarship assistance
 - If the student requests scholarship assistance while studying abroad, he/she is required to meet all enrollment and GPA requirements

ASP Institutional Nominee Slots

Institutional Nominee Slots

- Institutional Nominee slots and award amounts are authorized annually (subject to change)
- Presidents of Institutions are notified of authorization by letter from Chancellor.

ASP Institutional Nominees

- Institutional nominee slots are determined at the September/October State Regents meeting
- A letter from the Chancellor is sent to the university/college Presidents
 This letter is forwarded to the institutional scholarship coordinators
 - The Institutional Nominee spreadsheet is sent to institutions at end of spring semester.
- Completed spreadsheets and authorization forms must be <u>uploaded to</u> <u>O-Safe by deadline (July 21st)</u>.
- Institutional nominees are entered into our database and award letters are sent to scholars.

ASP Process – AQ Qualifiers

- Required ACT/SAT score determined for Oklahoma test takers at or above 99.5 percentile on ACT or SAT in October for upcoming year
- In October, applications for HS seniors made available at <u>www.okhighered.org/academic-scholars</u>
- Completed applications sent to the OSRHE office
- Award notifications letters are sent out to scholars
- A report with incoming Automatic Qualifiers are uploaded to OSAFE during the summer

ASP - Disbursement

- State Regents Office uploads certifications to OSAFE and email notifications are sent to institutions
 - Includes all new and continuing automatic qualifiers and institutional nominees
- Certifications are completed and uploaded back to OSAFE after add/drop (lock-in) date for semester.
- Certification records are entered in our database and a disbursement roster is uploaded to OSAFE
- After confirmation by the institution, funding is requested from the business office
- Checks are mailed or wire notifications are sent

- Established in 1994
- To enable public regional universities to provide four years of scholarship support to academically promising Oklahoma students enrolled in a baccalaureate program
- To enhance academic quality in public regional universities

Program Rules (Eligibility):

 Composite score of 30 on the ACT and a GPA and class rank which are exceptional as determined by the institution

OR

- National Merit Semifinalist or National Merit Commended Student
- Student must be an Oklahoma resident

- Each regional university was authorized 15 freshman nominee slots for fall 2023
- \$3,500 annual cash award
- Regional universities are required to offer a tuition waiver while the student is receiving the cash award

Retention Requirements

- Full-time Enrollment Each Semester
- Maintain at least a 3.25 Cumulative GPA
- Complete at least 24 Credit Hours Each Year

Program Rules

- Renewable for up to eight semesters or until a baccalaureate degree is received, whichever comes first
- Scholarship is not transferable

<u>Summer Semester</u>

To receive payment for enrollment in a summer term, the student must submit the summer term application to the State Regents' office by the application deadline

RUBS freshmen slots

- Freshmen slots and award amounts are approved annually. (subject to change)
- Presidents are notified of annual authorization by letter from Chancellor.

William P. Willis Scholarship Program

- Scholarship was established by the 1986
 Oklahoma Legislature
- The goal is to provide scholarships to low income, full-time undergraduates attending institutions in the Oklahoma state System of Higher Education

Program Rules (Eligibility):

- Nominee must be a full-time undergraduate
- Must have an effective income of \$32,000 or less per year (AGI minus standard or itemized deductions)
- Must be an Oklahoma resident
- Each institution nominates one student except NSU which nominates two students

Award Levels:

- \$3,000 at Research Universities
- \$2,400 at Regional Universities
- \$2,000 at Community Colleges

Program Rules

- Scholarship award is not-transferable
- It is recommended that institutions give priority to their previous year recipient. Recipients may receive the award for no more than four years
- Must be meeting Satisfactory Academic Progress requirements.

The program is available to certain students that are a child of any person killed after January 1, 2000, in the line of duty in any branch of the United States Armed Forces or who died after January 1, 2000, as a result of an injury sustained while in the line of duty and the person who was killed or died filed an individual or joint Oklahoma income tax return for the tax year prior to the year during which the person was killed or died.

Program Rules (Eligibility):

- Students must be Oklahoma residents and can sign up for the program up to the age of 21.
- The student must also begin postsecondary education by age 21.
- Heroes Promise students are not subject to the Oklahoma's Promise high school academic requirements or the family income requirements.
- Students must be approved for admission to an Oklahoma college or university.

- Once eligibility is established and the student begins postsecondary education, the award is the same as Oklahoma's Promise and the continuing eligibility requirements and limits are also the same.
- Heroes Promise students will appear on the Oklahoma's Promise eligibility list. A separate claim will not be required.
- Heroes Promise students are not subject to the high school requirements, they will not appear on the "potential" eligibility list.

The Independent Living Act was established by the 2000 Oklahoma Legislature to ensure that eligible individuals who have been or are in the foster care program of the Department of Human Services receive services that include housing, medical coverage and education.

- Student must be a resident of Oklahoma
- Student must have graduated within the previous three years from a State Board of Educationaccredited high school, the Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics or a high school bordering Oklahoma as approved by the State Board of Education OR the student must have completed the General Educational Development (GED) requirements.

- The student must have been in DHS custody for at least nine months between the ages of 16 and 18.
- Students must be enrolled in a public college or university or certain programs at technology centers.
- Tuition waivers will be made available to eligible students up to 26 years of age or upon completion of a baccalaureate degree, whichever comes first.
