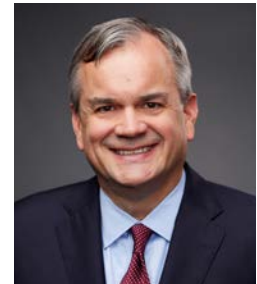

ROLE OF THE STATE REGENTS



Oklahoma's constitutional state system of higher education was established in 1941 by a vote of the people. The State Regents carry out a broad range of responsibilities, including setting academic standards for higher education, determining the functions and academic programs at state colleges and universities, and awarding degrees. We also allocate funding to each public institution, set tuition and fees within limits established by the Oklahoma Legislature, and oversee numerous scholarships and special initiatives.

The State Regents also operate OneNet, the state's advanced research and education network, and administer the Oklahoma College Assistance Program, which delivers essential college access services, financial literacy education, and student loan management support for students and the campus financial aid community.

While the State Regents serve as the coordinating board for the Oklahoma state system of higher education, individual governing boards of regents and boards of trustees are responsible for managing the operations of each institution and higher education program within the system.

As we reflect on 2025, findings of *The Economic and Fiscal Impact of the Oklahoma State System of Higher Education* underscore the essential role public higher education plays in driving statewide prosperity. Conducted by the University of Cincinnati Economics Center, this comprehensive analysis shows that Oklahoma's state system of higher education generated \$14.61 billion in total economic impact in FY 2024.

Beyond economic metrics, the study illustrates public higher education's broad community impact. In FY 2024, students dedicated 3.78 million hours to experiential learning, internships, clinical services, and service-based programs. Students, faculty, and staff volunteered 355,112 hours statewide. These efforts strengthen local communities and support critical public services.

Together, these findings affirm that Oklahoma's investment in public higher education continues to produce substantial and lasting benefits. Moving forward, the State Regents remain steadfast in our mission to advance educational attainment, meet changing workforce demands, and ensure that higher education remains a powerful engine of opportunity and economic growth for all Oklahomans.

HIGHER EDUCATION UPDATE



As I look ahead in my second year as chancellor of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, I am proud of our significant progress as a state system in 2025. Our achievements underscore our commitment to strengthening Oklahoma's educated workforce, expanding opportunities for students and families, and advancing the long-term economic health of our state.

In June, Regent Dennis Casey was reappointed for a second nine-year term, and the State Regents elected a new team of officers to guide the board through FY26: Chair Courtney Warmington, Vice Chair Dustin Hilliary, Secretary Justice Steven W. Taylor, and Assistant Secretary Mitch Adwon. Their leadership ensures our continued focus on affordability, efficiency, and innovation across the state system.

The findings of our 2025 economic and fiscal impact study quantify the return on investment of public higher education for individual Oklahomans and for our business community. Every dollar of state appropriations invested in our state system colleges and universities generates \$17.48 in economic output.

Fall enrollment across our colleges and universities increased for the fifth consecutive year in 2025. That growth occurred across research universities, regional universities, and community colleges, a strong indicator that Oklahomans recognize the value of higher education in a rapidly changing economy. Additionally, degree production increased 8.4% over the last academic year, 11% over the last five years, and 15.3% over the last 10 years. Over 91% of Oklahomans who graduate from a state system institution remain and work in the state one year after earning their degrees.

We thank our legislators and Governor Stitt for a 2.34% increase in state appropriations in FY26. Key investments include accelerated funding to help address deferred maintenance needs at public higher education institutions and ongoing support of the Oklahoma's Promise scholarship program, which was expanded to provide special income provisions for children of eligible certified public school teachers.

Targeted investments continued to advance campus innovation and workforce preparation. In December, the State Regents approved \$3.4 million in System Innovation Fund grants to maximize the impact and sustainability of AI applications in higher education and prepare the students we serve for tomorrow's evolving workplace. The State Regents also awarded \$150,000 in UpskillOK grants to expand microcredential programs that integrate AI literacy and support rapid upskilling and reskilling in high-demand fields.

As thoughtful stewards of state resources, the State Regents completed a systemwide review of 357 low-producing academic programs in 2025 to phase out programs that no longer meet student or workforce needs. This process identified 62 programs to be deleted or suspended; 193 programs to be retained with specific plans to increase enrollment and completion; and 102 low-cost or shared-cost programs, 80% of which are in critical occupations.

Our accomplishments in 2025 demonstrate the strength, value and resilience of Oklahoma's public higher education system. I am honored to serve the people of Oklahoma, working alongside our State Regents and the institutions as we continue building a stronger future for our students and our state.

STATE SYSTEM FAST FACTS



Associate and bachelor's degree holders earn a median income **25% and 75% higher**, respectively, than those with only a high school diploma.



Data from the National Center for Education Statistics show the cost of attendance at Oklahoma universities is **among the lowest in the nation**.



Over the last decade, STEM degrees **increased nearly 29%** at all levels.



Our students learn here, earn here — **91%** of Oklahomans who graduate from a state system college or university remain and work in the state one year after graduation.



For every dollar of state appropriations invested, the state system of higher education yields **\$17.48** in economic output.



Of Oklahoma's 100 critical occupations, the **top 22** highest-paying jobs require an associate degree or higher, and **eight of the top 10** fastest-growing jobs require a college degree.



Oklahoma has the **highest transfer-out rate in the nation**, a measure of first-time-entering students attending community colleges who transfer to a four-year institution within six years.

KEY INITIATIVES

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

OKLAHOMA'S PROMISE

Oklahoma's Promise is recognized as one of America's best college access programs and is considered a model that combines emphases on academic preparation and financial support for college. Over 15,000 students received Oklahoma's Promise scholarships in the last academic year.



CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT

The concurrent enrollment program allows eligible juniors and seniors to earn college credit while still in high school, which strengthens student preparation, reduces family college costs, and decreases the time required to complete a degree. More than 20,700 students enrolled in concurrent courses, generating over 193,000 credit hours in the last academic year.



OKCOLLEGESTART.ORG

The state's web-based college and career planning portal has over 124,000 active accounts across the state and offers extensive information and tools to help students, parents and adult learners prepare, plan and pay for college. OKcollegestart serves as an ICAP administration platform for K-12 educators and features robust career planning resources, including career profiles that outline higher education requirements and expected salaries.



GEAR UP

Oklahoma GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) is the fifth consecutive federally funded grant program administered by the State Regents. GEAR UP is designed to prepare middle and high school students for college success through direct student support services, including college campus tours, ACT preparation and testing, college exploration courses, one-on-one guidance from school site directors, and Oklahoma's Promise and FAFSA completion assistance.



OKLAHOMA TEACHER CONNECTION

Through collaborative partnerships and strategically focused efforts, the Oklahoma Teacher Connection (OTC) supports initiatives and programs designed to recruit, retain and place teachers in Oklahoma classrooms. Supporting PK-12 and higher education, in addition to professional development opportunities, OTC has directly impacted thousands of educators and students through professional development, curriculum, policy, scholarships and incentive programs.



INSPIRED TO TEACH

Inspired to Teach allows eligible students who declare teacher education as a college major to receive a scholarship during undergraduate matriculation and an incentive award for committing to teach five consecutive years in an Oklahoma public school, for a total of up to \$25,500 in scholarships and employment incentives.



KEY INITIATIVES

ADULT LEARNERS

REACH HIGHER

Through the Reach Higher program, 27 public and private institutions provide specialized advising and support systems to help adult students re-enroll in college and complete degrees aligned with Oklahoma's high-demand industries. The program also offers financial assistance, awarding \$1 million in scholarships each fiscal year to eligible adult learners. Since its inception, Reach Higher has helped more than 13,000 adult students earn their degrees, strengthening Oklahoma's workforce and expanding opportunity across the state.



SHOW WHAT YOU KNOW

ShowWhatYouKnowOK.org is a dedicated website that empowers students to determine how previously earned college credit, licenses, certifications, military training, advanced standing scores, and knowledge gained through other learning experiences can be applied toward a college degree.



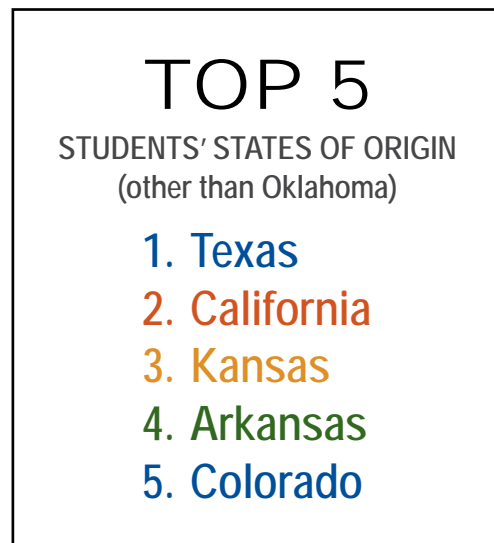
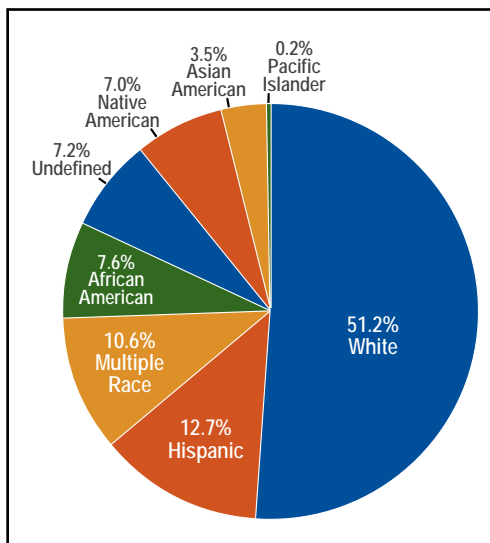
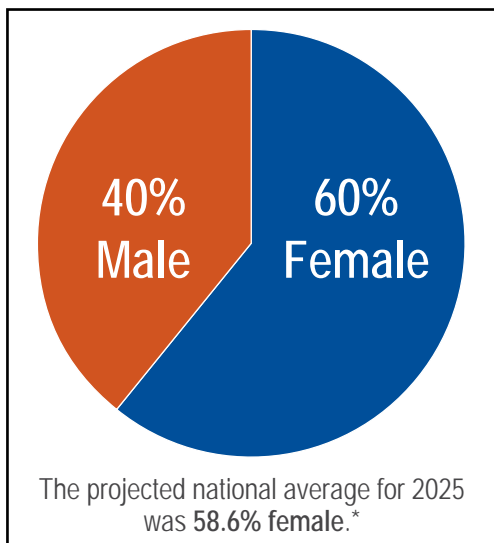
UPSKILLOK

UpskillOK, the State Regents' microcredentials initiative, continues to build a statewide framework of more than 500 microcredential pathways offered in partnership with over 160 industry employers. Designed to meet evolving workforce demands, UpskillOK microcredentials equip learners — both degree-seeking students and current degree-holders — with targeted, industry-aligned skills, competencies and knowledge that are immediately applicable and transferable to the workplace. More than 40,000 microcredentials have been awarded since the first program launched in May 2022.

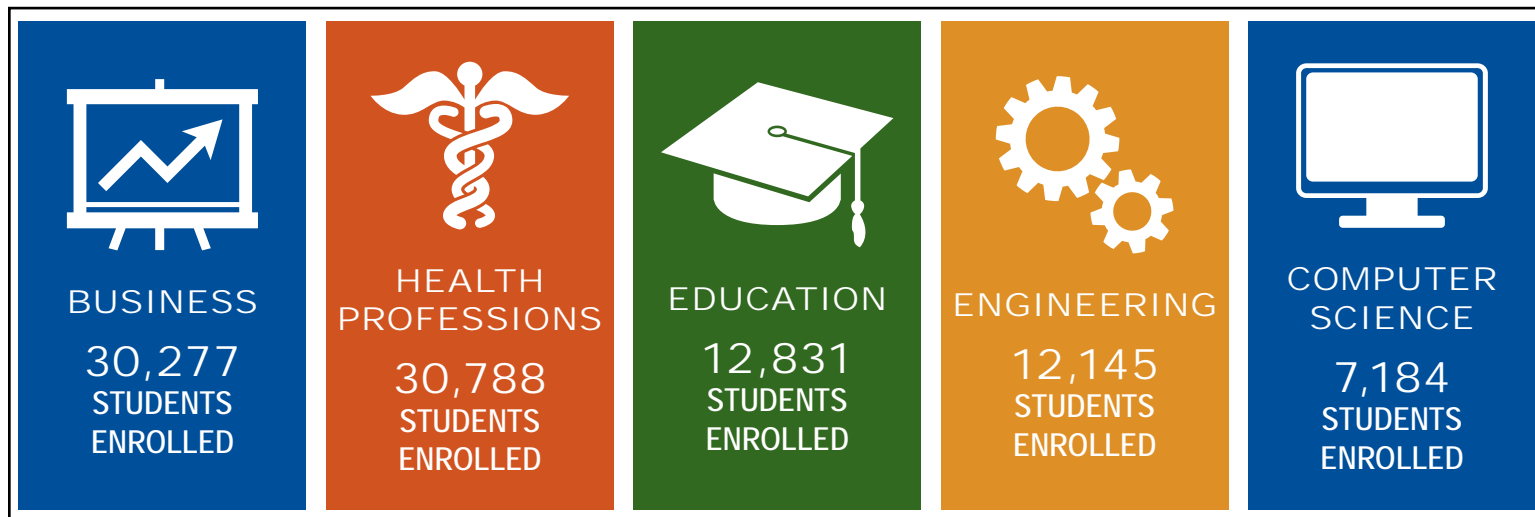
2024-25 OKLAHOMA PUBLIC INSTITUTION DEMOGRAPHICS

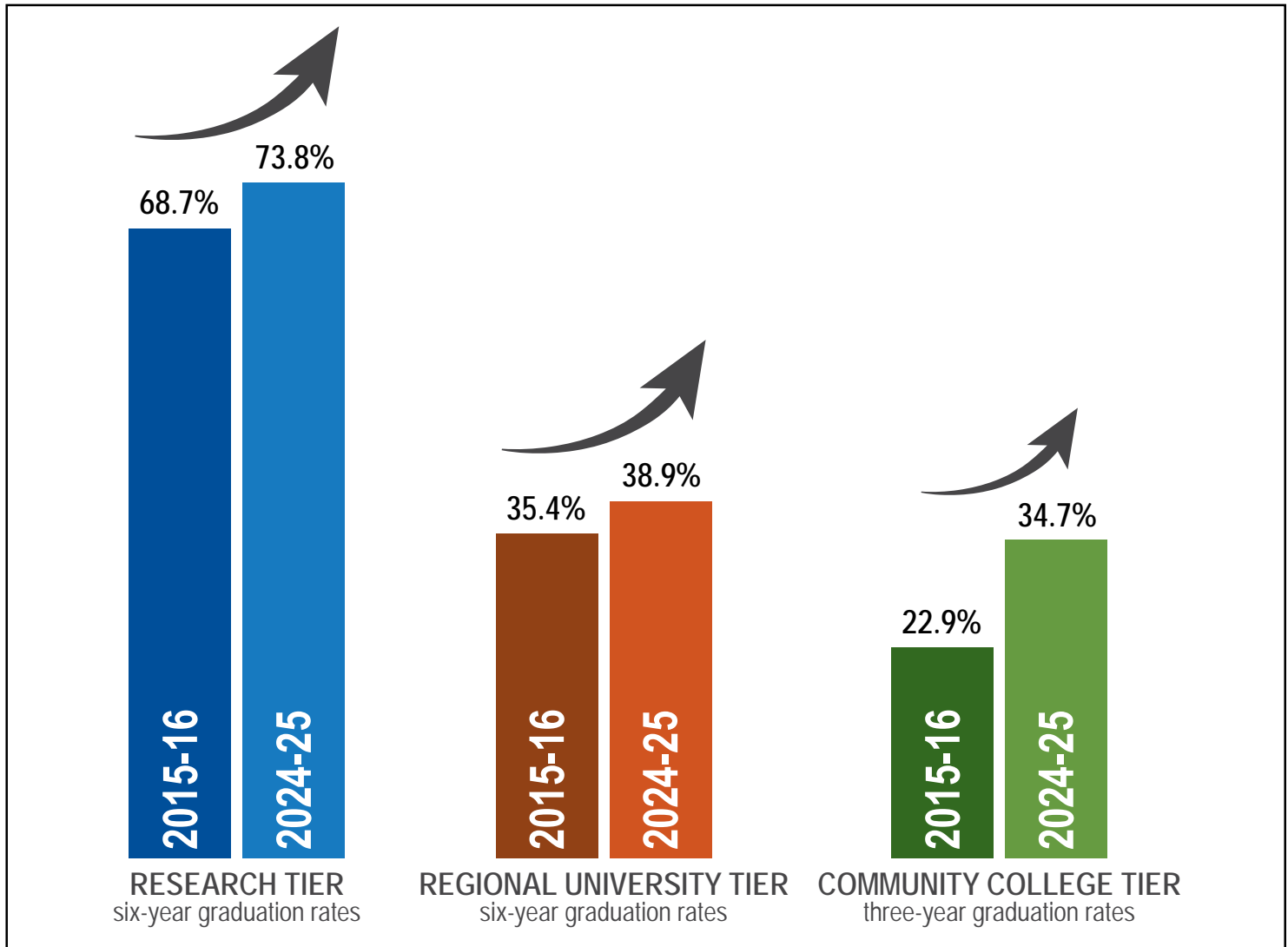

STUDENT RETENTION RATES

GRADUATION RATES FOR NEW OKLAHOMA FRESHMEN

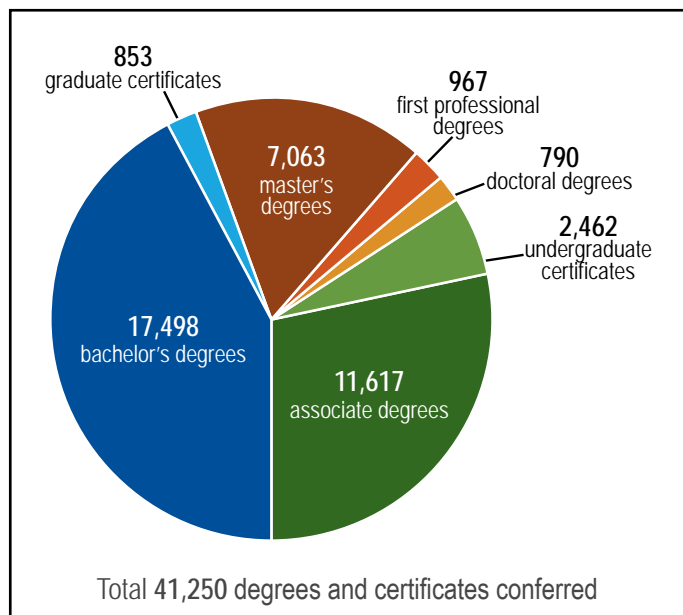
Over the last 10 years, graduation rates have increased at all institutional tiers. Degree and certificate production at our public colleges and universities increased 15.3% over the last decade.



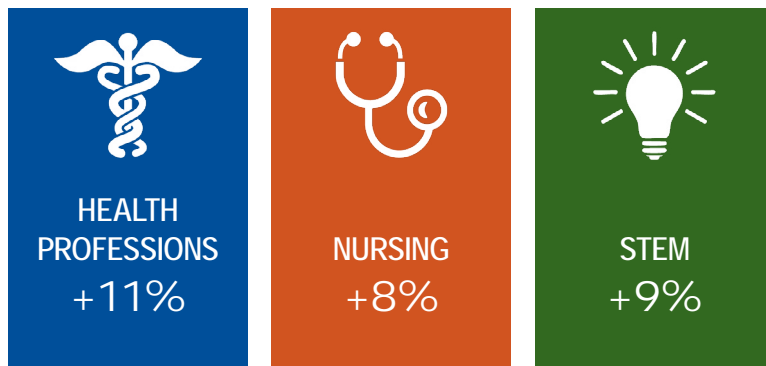
