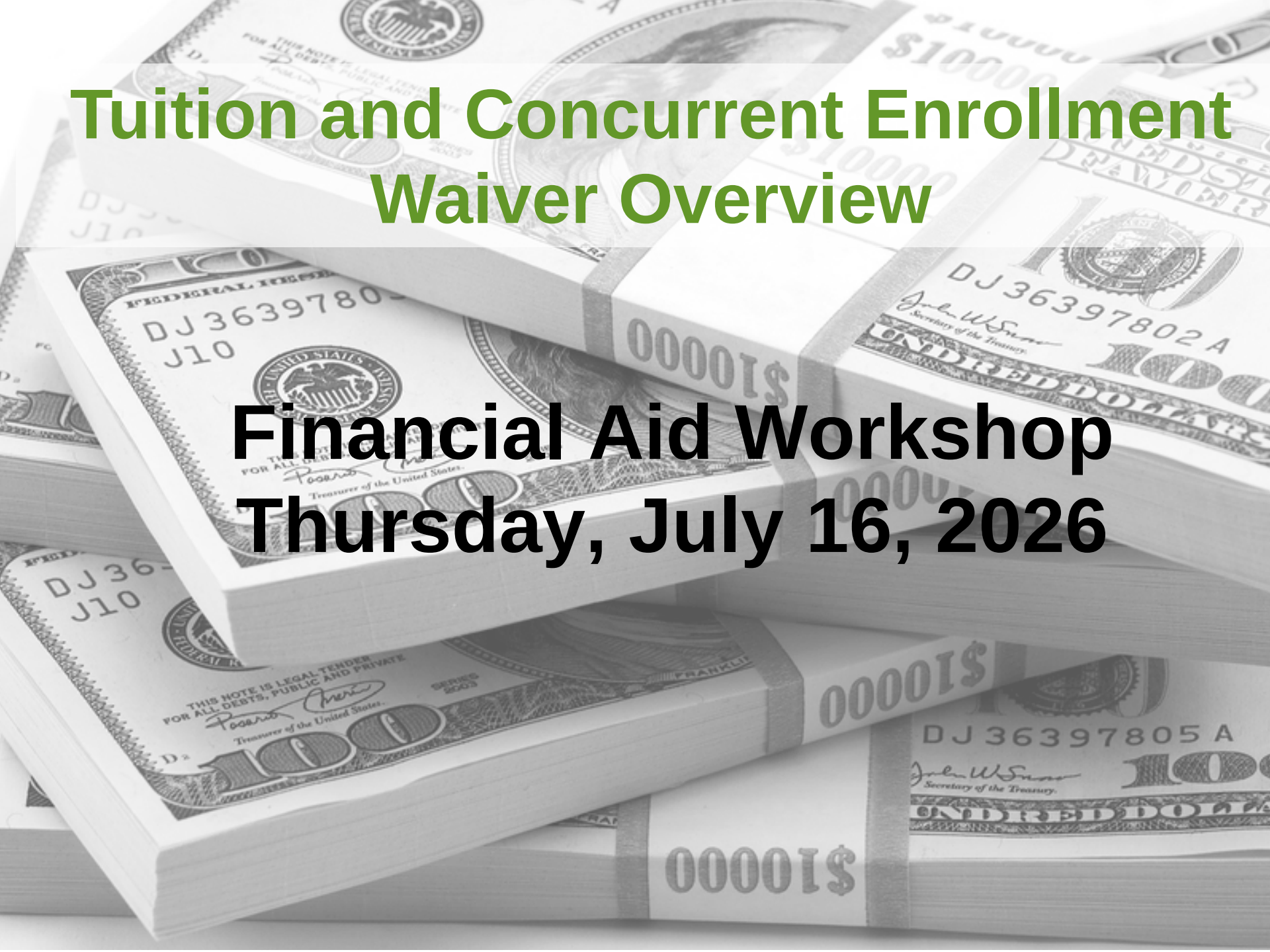


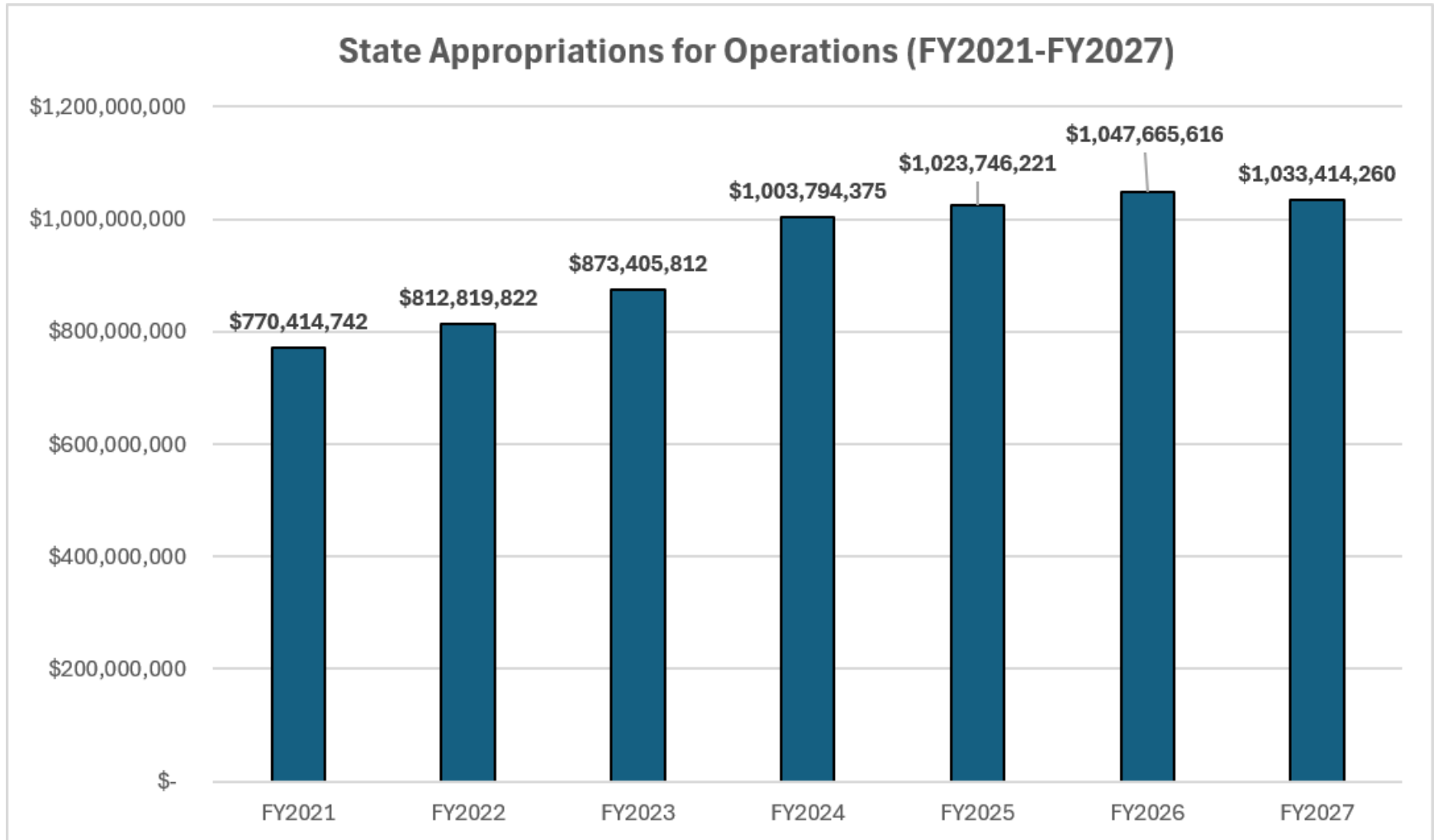

FY27 New Allocations to Financial Aid/Scholarships

- \$4.73 million to Oklahoma Rising Scholars Award Program

Legislation in HB1281 (2026) authorized the renaming of the Oklahoma Academic Scholars Program to the Oklahoma Rising Scholars Award Program.

- \$10 million to Oklahoma's Promise Program

Brings the Oklahoma's Promise program total to \$80 million for FY27.

Resident and Nonresident Tuition Waivers

Total FY27 Budgeted Waivers

Resident Waivers Within 5.0% limitation:

- \$156.1 million authorized for waivers – Only 59.3% Budgeted
- \$92.5 million budgeted for waivers, an increase of \$5.6 million from FY2026 budgeted (6.5% increase)

Resident Waivers Outside 5.0% limitation:

- \$30.7 million budgeted, increase of \$573,509 (1.9% increase)

Nonresident Waivers:

- \$194 million budgeted for nonresident students
- An increase of \$12.9 million from FY2026 budgeted (7.1%)

Total Waivers:

- \$317.6 million in budgeted waivers
- An increase of \$19.1 million, or 6.4%.
- Represents 10.2% of total budgets

Resident Tuition Waiver Policy

- Institutions are authorized to award scholarships to Oklahoma residents from the Part I E&G budget in the form of resident tuition waivers, provided the total amount awarded does not exceed **five percent (5%)** of the total Part 1 E&G budget for the current year. Students will be disqualified from receiving a tuition waiver based on immigration status if the student does not qualify for resident tuition pursuant to 70 O.S. §§ 3242 and 324.2, *adopted in February 2024*

Basis of Award – 5.0% Requirement

- Resident students only
- Increased from 3% in FY04 to comply with legislative intent to increase financial aid proportionate to tuition increases and pilot program approved in FY20 to 5% of Part 1 E&G Budget and permanent change in FY24 to support retention strategies
- Four categories: Financial Need, Scholarship and Student Achievement, Benefits for Eligible Employees, and Concurrently Enrolled Students (first 18 credit hours for high school seniors excluded, all others subject this limitation)
- 50% of these scholarships must be awarded to students with financial need

State Regents' Tuition Waiver

Key Policy Provisions

- Tuition and fees may neither be assessed nor waived unless authorized by general policy or specific authorization of the State Regents (4.18.4A, and 4.18.6)
- Intent of the resident waiver is to provide assistance to Oklahoma students with demonstrated need and to promote excellence of scholarship throughout all academic levels and professional fields of study (4.18.5A)

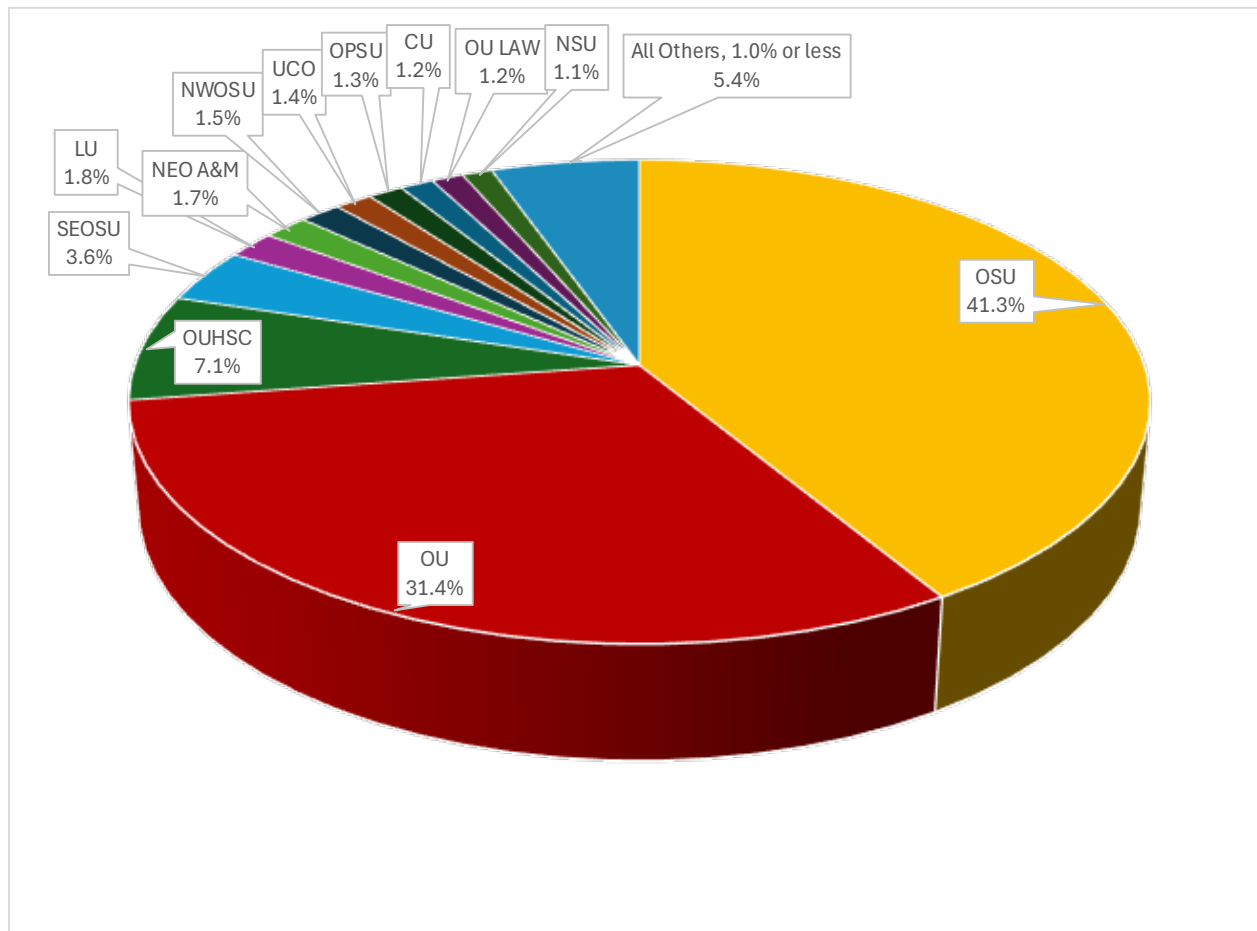

Nonresident Waivers

- Policy Definition (4.18.5 B – 1.)
 - Any institution in The State System may award a scholarship that includes a waiver of a portion of the nonresident tuition as provided in 70 O.S. § 3226 which the amount shall not exceed the difference between nonresident tuition and the amount paid by resident students.

Full Nonresident Tuition Waivers

- By policy there are only three ways in which to grant a “full” 100% waiver of nonresident and resident tuition:
 - A. Pay the difference of the resident portion by some cash source – foundation, private scholarship funds, private sponsorship
 - B. Request and be granted an exception to policy by formal action of the State Regents. Several institutions to date have requested exceptions for fee waivers only.
 - C. Specifically authorized in resident waiver policies (i.e. Oklahoma Rising Scholars, Graduate Assistants, Prisoner of Wars, MIA and their dependents, Student on Reciprocal Exchange, Dependents of Peace Officers or Fire-Fighters killed in action)

CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT WAIVERS

Concurrent Enrollment Waiver Program

Senate Bill 1196

Amended 70 O.S. § 628.13

Effective date July 1, 2018 – Fall 2018 Semester

Concurrent Enrollment Program

- ✓ High School Seniors eligible for 18 hours of tuition waiver during their senior year – no longer limited to six hours per semester.
- ✓ Subject to the Senior Waiver Program being fully-funded, juniors may receive tuition waivers up to 9-credit hours, subject to availability of funds.
- ✓ Annual reporting requirements on OSRHE.
- ✓ In FY2027, we are funded at 100% of actual waivers for Senior and Junior High School participants.
